LONDON, June 22.-The king's birthday honors were announced today. The list includes a large number of barons and baronets, but includes few notable names. Lord Kitchener of Khartum, his majesty's agent and consul general in Ewypt, is made an earl.

Sir Herbert Cozens Hardy, Sir Edgar Vincent, Major General John Fielden Brocklehurst and Sir Leonard L. Lyell are raised to barons. Among the baronets is Albert H. Stanley, manager of the London underground railroads, who is English-born, but was reared in the United States.

Other baronets named are Sir Joseph Beecham, the manufacturer and philanthropist; George Henschell, the com-poser, and Sir T. Van Sittart Bowster,


