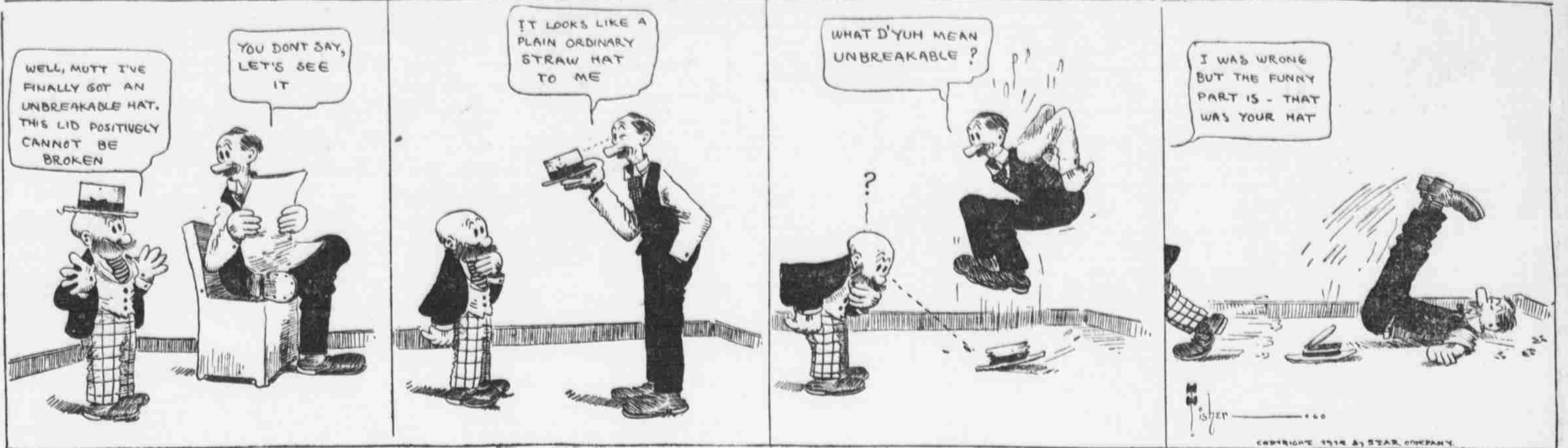

ROURKES WIN FROM JOSIES

Styles Holds Josies Down, While Duffy Loses Grip on Locals.

"BILL" STARTS BALL ROLLING

Schlipke Opens the Winning Event with a Hit Which is Followed by a Bunch of Runs on the Part of Pa's Players.

Mr. Duffy, who twirled against the Rourkes last spring on the coldest day of the year when the Pittsburgh Pirates were here to show how easy it is to beat a minor league club, essayed to toll against the same Rourkes yesterday afternoon only in a St. Joseph uniform, due to his transfer of residence. Mr. Duffy did very well when the Pirates were behind him, but he did very much the opposite against the Rourkes. He was lambasted from the start and the start was all that he lasted. He was jerked after five runs had been made, but the game was safe and the locals won, 7 to 3.

So Sterner was given the job and the Rourkes made another count for luck. Skipper Bill Schlipke opened the battle with a hit.
