Cows and heifers were also about steady, but it would be well for the country to bear in mind that grass cows are very much neglected and slow sellers. The packers may be depended upon to bear such cattle as often as receipts are large enough to give them the opportunity. Stockers and feeders continue slow, with common kinds especially dull, but without any very great change in prices.
