

ADVICE ON KEEPING COOL

At Summer School of Missions, Mrs. Wells Principal Speaker.

TELLS THE WOMEN SOME THINGS

One hundred or so women Thursday afternoon attended the Summer School of Missions and were trying to keep cool by vigorously fanning themselves when the speaker, Mrs. D. B. Wells of New York City, reprimanded them for wasting so much energy.

The amount of energy expended in waving those large straw fans is only serving to make you hotter," asserted Mrs. Wells, whereupon the women became still hotter, either in an attempt to compute this problem or because of the rebuke.

Mrs. Wells, speaking of church activities, said: "They ought to follow the fashion and call in a business expert to direct church work, for, as an example, missionary meetings are conducted today in the same manner as they were forty years ago."

In passing, the speaker scolded the housewives who fail to use their heads to save their heads and advised them to call in a kitchen expert. She asserted that "the only warrant for imposing the Christian religion on the countless heathen as the missionaries have been doing, is the consciousness that religion

is not comparative. There is only one and that is the Christian religion."
