Pistol toting is rapidly going out of style in this city, due to the fact that the slit skirt, the house fly, as well as a host of other recent innovations, are proving just as deadly and not quite so mussy in operation.
Alto Police Judge Foster's new plan of fining gunoters \$50 and trimmings for the first offense and a grand jury session for the second may have something to do with it.

During the last two days five pistol totingers have decided to dispense with their weapons, the fine being the medium giving impetus to the decision.
Tony Goletta and Sebastian Mileo were awarded \$50 plus each and suffered the confiscation of pistols. Frank Patterson, city dog catcher, who shot at two railroad special watchmen when he thought they were holdup men, was fined \$25 and.

"Yes, the pistol toting habit is passe," remarked the judge in passing sentence. "The foreign style makers no longer consider the old \$5 as something swagger. Omahans will have to forego their weapons, for at all hazards Omaha must be up-to-the-minute in the latest styles."

Local Banks Will Not Lose by the Claflin Failure

"No, I don't think much Claflin paper is held by Omaha banks or by banks in this vicinity," said a well known local banker. "I know that our bank has not dealt in any of that kind of paper recently. The fact that there is no local Claflin retail store will help explain our fortunate situation in this respect."

The reminder that none of the Omaha mercantile establishments is connected up with the Claflin interests is not to be taken, so it is said, that efforts have not been made by the Claflins to obtain a foothold in Omaha. It is understood that a year or more ago they had representatives looking over the field with a view to possible negotiation, but that nothing came of it.

The Claflin difficulties recall also that a former Omaha boy, Asa Shiverick, whose father was once a leading furniture dealer here, has been holding responsible positions in different sub-companies, and is now the manager of the big Claflin department stores in Cleveland.

WIDOW OF FAMOUS BALL PLAYER DIES IN OMAHA

Mrs. Mary Walsh, widow of the late Joseph Walsh, well known in Omaha as the shortstop on the famous Union Pacific ball team thirty years ago, died Friday morning at her residence, 1285 South Tenth street, after an illness of four months. Mrs. Walsh was a resident of Omaha for thirty-four years, coming here from Illinois, where she was born. She was 52 years of age. She is survived by three sisters and five brothers. Two sisters and three brothers reside in California and one sister and two brothers in Illinois. Mrs. Firth, the sister who lives in California, has been at the bedside of Mrs. Walsh during the illness. Funeral will be held Monday morning at 9 o'clock from St. Philomena church. Interment will be at Holy Sepulcher cemetery.

NICHOLAS VIADUCT MAY BE OPEN BY AUGUST 15

Work is progressing rapidly on the Nicholas street viaduct over the railroad tracks, and indications are that the structure will be opened to traffic not later than the middle of August. The structural steel is more than half in place and laying the floor of the completed portion is going on.

The concrete work at both ends of the viaduct is complete and approaches are being graded. Over the railroad tracks the steel frame of the structure is some ten feet above the tops of the highest freight cars.

ROADMASTER STAFFORD TO BE BURIED IN OMAHA

Peter Stafford of Norfolk died Thursday at Norfolk after an illness of ten days following an operation. The body will arrive here this afternoon at 2 o'clock on a special Northwestern train. Interment will be at Holy Sepulcher cemetery. Father Buckley of Norfolk will accompany the body and will read the services. Mr. Stafford was a roadmaster for the Northwestern for forty-two years and was well liked by all with whom he came in contact. He is survived by his wife, five sons and one daughter. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus and the Elks. A delegation of railroad men and personal friends from Norfolk will come to Omaha for the funeral. He will be buried here because of a wish to be placed beside his brother, who died in Omaha about six years ago, and a daughter, who died here some time ago.

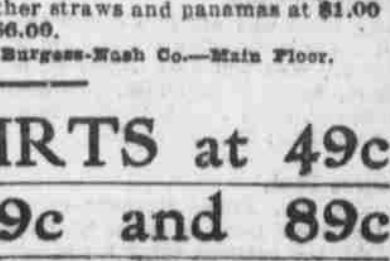
