

FRUITS HERE IN ABUNDANCE

Watermelons Are Also on Market and Are Said to Be Cheap.

PRICE OF SUGAR IS GOING UP

Home Grown as Well as California Fruits Cheap—Lemons Advance

—Potatoes Take a Jump—May Not Be Cheap.

First shipments of watermelons from Georgia have arrived in Omaha and are now extensively on the Omaha market.

Fruits are here in abundance. Home grown fruits and California fruits alike are selling at extremely low prices.

Lemons have advanced a bit. Twenty-five cents a dozen is the lowest lemon price now.

Standard canteloupes have taken a drop. They are now selling for 5 cents apiece.

Sugar is still advancing. Cane sugar is now valued at 4.85, while beet sugar is valued at 4.15.

Potatoes have taken a jump. The price to the retailer has been advanced to a dollar a bushel.

Distinguished lecturers from England and this country will be brought to Omaha next winter by the Omaha Society of Fine Arts and some of its individual members.

Among the other speakers will be J. R. Stoughton Holborn, M. A., of Oxford, England, who will have as his subject, "Greek Sculpture and Beauty of Form"; James Henry Brewster, Ph.D., professor of Egyptology, University of Chicago, who will speak on "The Art of Egypt"; and Edward Howard Griggs, lecturer on art subjects of New York City.

An additional feature of next year's program, which has been arranged by a committee of which Mrs. A. W. Jeffers is chairman, is a number of lectures by Omaha men and women. "Architecture and Allied Arts" is the subject for the year's work.

Sister Asks that Brother Be Listed as Legally Dead

That H. C. Kracht, from whom no word has been heard for thirty years, be declared legally dead by the district court here, in order that his aged sister, Mrs. Margaret Schoettiger, may collect \$1,000 insurance on the life of the late Hans N. Kracht, her brother, is asked by the sister in a petition just filed.

A suit was brought by an administrator of the estate of Hans Kracht, who died leaving only one natural heir, against the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Trainmen. Mrs. Schoettiger, hearing of the case in faraway Prussia, has come forward to protect her rights, according to her petition.

H. C. Kracht was beneficiary under the policy and if he be declared legally dead the sister will receive the \$1,000. No proof of death exists. He was last seen by relatives at Clinton, Ia. In 1880 he wrote a letter from New Orleans saying he was sick and asking for money.

CARPENTER ARRESTED IN THE WILD HORSE CASES

A. N. Stapleton a carpenter living at 112 South Twentieth street, has been arrested by Deputy United States Marshal H. P. Haze and George McCullum, charged with complicity in the Arizona wild horse case, whereby hundreds of farmers' of Nebraska, Iowa and Kansas are said to have been defrauded out of more than \$1,000,000. In default of \$3,000, Stapleton was sent to the Douglas county jail.
