DEAN LEWIS LEAVES U. OF P.

William Gray Lewis, Washington party (progressive) candidate for governor of Pennsylvania, has resigned as dean of the University of Pennsylvania law school. William E. Mikel, who has been an instructor and professor in that institution since 1875, has been elected dean for the ensuing year. Mr. Lewis was granted a year's leave of absence from the university when he determined to enter the gubernatorial contest, but the fact that he had resigned as dean was made public only when it was reported that his resignation was accepted at a meeting of the board of trustees on June 1. Dr. Lewis has been at the head of the law school since 1896.
