Dancing Teacher Reports Latest Notions of Masters at Convention.
EQUINE CANTER TO BE POPULAR
Chambers Introduces Waits of the Wind and Canter Hesitation, Which Are Well Taken by Association.

Waiving like the wind and cantering like a horse will become popular society diversions, according to W. E. Chambers, Omaha dancing teacher, who has returned from the thirty-first annual meeting of the National Association of Dancing Masters, held in Cleveland.

The gathering of the winds, their change, whirl and driving such as typical in the waifs of the winds, which was originated by Mr. Chambers and made a hit with his associates. He also created the canter hesitation and the kiss waifs, the latter being a stage dance.

Beautiful rhythmic grace, rather than the "beaten" bugs and wriggles characteristic of most of the present dances, will be a feature of all the new dances to be taken up by society during the late summer and fall, according to Mr. Chambers. The popular interpretation of the Castle walk will lead to its early dismissal from select and proper dancing, he asserts.

New Touch-Me-Not Dance. The innovation, one of the newest steps, is really an innovation. It is danced entirely without the partners touching each other, even with their finger tips.

Standards of technique and propriety, upon which Mr. Chambers has persistently insisted, met with decided approval from his fellow dancing masters. No matter how finished, will maintain high standards in the art, he asserts.
