MARTIAL LAW IS PROCLAIMED IN CENTRAL BOSNIA

(Continued from Page One.)

Their lives in the belief that they will go down to history as patriots. Yesterday's crime seems likely to have a contrary effect to that desired by its authors. Even before the bodies of the murdered couple had been interred, the Austrian authorities are contemplating severe measures against the Serbs in Austria and Bosnia. These measures are likely to embitter the relations between the countries as well as those between Austria and Russia, the protector of all the Serbs.

Archduke Aware of Danger.

Archduke Francis Ferdinand, it is asserted today, was well aware of the danger he was running during his tour of Bosnia, which he undertook as inspector general of the forces of the empire. This title was conferred on his last year by Emperor Francis Joseph. His chief task was to inspect the Austrian army, which guarded the Serbian frontier during the recent Balkan wars and prevented any encroachments by Serbian troops.

The Serbian minister at Vienna told Archduke Francis Ferdinand of the peril of his visit to Sarajevo at the present time and implied him, even if he insisted on going there himself, at least to leave the duchess at home.

When the duchess of Hohenberg was informed, however, of the dangerous nature of the journey the archduke was about to take, she said her place was at her husband's side.

When the archduke and the duchess arrived at Sarajevo on Saturday, some signs of hostility were shown by the Serb portion of the population. Just before the couple passed through the city, the authorities succeeded in getting rid of a "threat display" of Serbian flags which the people had hoisted, instead of flying the Austrian colors.

Feeling, however, was carried to the extreme when at a session of the Bosnian Diet, called to express sorrow at the death of the archduke, four Serbian deputies appeared in light suits in contrast to the somber black of their fellow deputies.

Fired from Step of Car.

Princip's plans were carefully laid. He secreted himself behind a building at a spot where it was necessary for the archduke's car to slacken speed. Some accounts of the crime say that Princip actually stood on the step of the car as he fired the shots.

Against all these carefully laid plans of the criminals, the extraordinary precautions taken by the authorities proved unavailing, for the murderer struck rightly that the archduke would not be frightened into giving up his program after the first bomb had failed.

In Princip's rooms the police found a large sum of money, which they say is further proof that he was a paid assassin of some Serbian organization.

The sympathy not only of the rulers, but of the people has been expressed to the aged emperor Francis Joseph, whose much needed rest at his residence at Ischl, has been broken by the crime. He left Ischl, where he was recuperating from his recent severe illness, for Vienna this morning. The imperial train stopped at Anstetten, where the emperor was joined by Archduke Francis Salvator and by his only daughter, the Archduchess Maria Valerie.

Will Affect European Situation. Archduke Francis Ferdinand's death is certain to have considerable effect on the European situation. Rightly or wrongly, he was credited with having ambitions for the further extension of Austrian territory toward the Gulf of Saloniki, which would, if attempted, lead to a conflict with Austria's neighbors, and this again causes a rupture between the dual monarchy and Russia.

The archduke's friendship for the German emperor also gave his enemies in Europe an opportunity to accuse him of favoring an aggressive policy, and it had been a fetish in the continental capital that when he came to the throne there would be an end to the peace that had prevailed among the great powers.

Personally, the archduke and his wife were about as great favorites in England

HEIR TO CROWN MURDERED

Archduke Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary and Wife Are Shot.

ANOTHER BLOODY ROYAL DEATH

House of Hapsburg Again Sees Murder Take Away Its Succession's Props — Attempt with Bomb Fails.

SARAJEVO, June 29.—Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the Austro-Hungarian throne, and his morganatic wife, the duchess of Hohenberg, were assassinated yesterday while driving through streets of Sarajevo, the Bosnian capital. A youthful Serbian student fired the shots which added another to the long list of tragedies that has darkened the reign of Emperor Franz Joseph.

The archduke and his wife were victims of the second attempt in the same day against their lives. First a bomb was thrown at the automobile in which they were driving to the town hall. Forewarned, however, of a possible attempt against his life, the archduke was watching and struck the missile aside with his arm. It fell under an automobile which carried members of his suite, wounding Count von Boos Waldeck and Colonel Merizko.

On their return from the town hall the archduke and duchess were driving to the hospital when the Serbian, Gavrio Princip, darted at the car and fired a volley at the occupants. His aim was true, for the archduke and his wife were mortally wounded. With them at the time was the governor of the city, who escaped injury. The bodies of his murdered companions collapsed across him and protected him from stray bullets.

Death Comes at Once.

The governor shouted to the chauffeur to rush to the palace at top speed. Physicians were in prompt attendance, but their services were useless, as the archduke and his wife were dead before the palace was reached.

Until the emperor's wishes are known the bodies will lie in state at the palace here. They will doubtless be interred in the Hapsburg vaults in the Capuchin church at Vienna.

In Sarajevo there is mourning everywhere, with black draped flags and streamers on all public buildings. The president has sent a message to the emperor congratulating him on the victory of the whole population at the ruthless crime and assuring his majesty of the people's devotion to the ruling house.

Score Injures by Bomb.

Throughout the day weeping women were to be seen in groups, while great crowds surrounded the spots where the bomb exploded and where the fatal shots were fired. The bomb, filled with nails and lead filings and the explosion was violent. The iron shutters on many shops were splintered by flying fragments and iron railings were smashed. About a score of persons were injured, several of them being women and children.

The murders occurred with such rapidity that many persons near the scene did not even hear the shots. The street is very narrow and the assassin was able to fire at close range.

Anti-Serbian Demonstrations.

Anti-Serbian demonstrations began tonight. The crowds knelt in the streets and sang the national anthem. The mayor issued a proclamation to the residents of the city denouncing the crime and declaring that by the commission of the assassins it was shown beyond all doubt that the bomb thrown at the archduke's car came from Belgrade. It is said that after the attempt with the bomb near the girls' high school the duchess tried to dissuade the archduke from venturing in the motor car again. To allay her fears, M. P. Petrovic, of Bosnia, said: "It's all over now, we have more than one murderer in Sarajevo." Whereupon the archduke decided to go on.

At a meeting of the provincial diet tonight the president of the chamber expressed Bosnia's profound sorrow and indignation over the outrage and paid a glowing tribute to the heroic conduct of the duchess. He also declared his unshakable love and devotion to the emperor and the ruling house.

On Annual Visit to Capital.

Archduke Franz Ferdinand and the Princess of Hohenberg were slain while passing through the city on their annual visit to the annexed provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The archduke was struck full in the face and the princess was shot through the abdomen and breast. They died a few minutes after reaching the palace to which they were hurried with all possible speed.

Those responsible for the assassination took good care it should prove effective as there were two assaults, the first with a bomb and the second with a revolver. The bomb was thrown at the royal automobile as it was proceeding to the town hall, where a reception was to be held. The archduke saw the missile hurtling through the air and warded it off with his arm. It fell outside the car and exploded, slightly wounding two aides de camp in a second car and half a dozen spectators.

Revolver Shots Kill.

It was on the return of the procession that the tragedy was added to the long list of those that have darkened the pages of the recent history of the Hapsburgs. As the royal automobile reached a prominent point in the route to the palace, an eighth grade student, Gavrio Princip, sprang out of the crowd and poured a deadly fusillade of bullets from an automatic pistol at the archduke and princess.

Princip and a fellow conspirator, a compositor from Trebinje, named Gabrinovic, barely escaped lynching by the infuriated spectators. They finally were seized by the police, who afforded them protection. Both are natives of the annexed province of Herzegovina.

The first attempt against the archduke occurred just outside the girls' high school. His car had restarted after a brief pause for an inspection of the building when Gabrinovic hurled the bomb. This was so successfully warded off by the archduke that it fell directly beneath the following car, the occupants of which, Count von Boos Waldeck and Colonel Merizko, were struck by shrapnel of iron.

Archduke Franz Ferdinand stopped his car and after making inquiries as to their injuries and lending what aid he could, continued his journey to the town hall. There the burgomaster began the cus-

RIOT IN EAST PITTSBURGH

Fickets Prevent Persons from Entering Westinghouse Plant.

SHERIFF CALLS ON THE POLICE

Special Officers and Deputies Are Unable to Quiet Crowd and State is Asked to Send Troops.

PITTSBURGH, June 29.—Disorder broke out among the striking Westinghouse employees in East Pittsburgh today, pickets surrounding all entrances to the electric works and preventing persons from entering. The presence of twenty armed guards from the plant had no effect on the excited crowds. Deputy sheriffs failed to quiet the people and the local police, reinforced by twenty special officers, could do nothing. Sheriff C. V. Richards arranged to call on the state for help and when a report spread that the Greensburg troops of the state constabulary was on its way to the town the excitement increased.

GARDEN ADVISES HIS COUNTRYMEN TO LEAVE MEXICO

Where efforts are being made to face the advance of General Villa's army. Boys and Wounded. Two regiments of federals were sent to Queretaro from the capital on Saturday. Those who saw them passing through the streets assert that the ranks were filled with boys and soldiers taken from the hospital before their wounds were half healed.

Conditions among the population of the capital are asserted by the refugees to be ominous. The disintegration of the federal army has become widely known and the feeling among British residents is so strong that Huerta will be unable to hold off the constitutionalists and retain control in the capital long enough to prevent the humiliation of his forcible removal from office, that the British consul is preparing to defend itself during the days of expected turmoil in Mexico City.

The refugees say that other foreign colonies in the capital are taking similar precautions.

Long Line of Tragedy.

The final tragedy which has come to the house of Hapsburg is the culmination of the personal sorrows that have overshadowed the life of the emperor. In 1882 the list of tragic incidents began with an accident upon his own life, when a Hungarian wounded him with a knife.

Fourteen years later his brother, Archduke Maximilian, emperor of Mexico, was condemned to death by court-martial and executed. Then followed the burning to death of a niece in Vienna, a sister in Paris and the death by suicide in Stahrenberg lake of a cousin.

In 1888 the emperor's wife, who was the daughter of Maximilian Joseph, duke of Bavaria, was stabbed to death at Geneva by a man called Italian. Less than ten years before the emperor's only son, the Crown Prince Rudolf, met death in a mysterious way to this day has not been cleared. On January 30, 1889, his body was found in a hunting lodge at Meyerling not far from Vienna. Beside his body lay that of the Baroness Marie Vetsera.

tain Hopkins on May 12, 1914, he enclosed a newspaper clipping relative to the identity of the three gentlemen named by the Huerta government to represent it at the Niagara Falls mediation conference, and said:

"I think you should use the enclosed clipping of May 11 as the basis of a strong article in the New York Herald and elsewhere, as you can arrange, showing that all three of Huerta's peace envoys are controlled by Cowdry. You should also say that General Huerta is Cowdry's personal attorney in Mexico and chairman of the Mexican board, National Railways of Mexico, since Limantour left Mexico."

This letter of Mr. Pierce to Captain Hopkins acquires significance, not only from its attack upon Eguero and his associates and his desire to see this exposed "in the New York Herald and elsewhere," but in its reference to the railway situation. It will be noted that Mr. Pierce urges upon Captain Hopkins the necessity for General Carranza acting promptly, as otherwise "the railroad situation will be beyond his control, because when Huerta is disposed of, England and Germany will naturally convince the United States that Cowdry's long time control of the railroad and, in fact, of Mexico, must not be disturbed."

To Influence Eguero.

In this letter, Mr. Pierce is kind enough to enclose the copy of a telegram received by him from McDonald, whom he describes as "Galbraith's assistant," in whom Mr. McDonald expresses confidence, and concludes:

"You can use influence Luis Eguero by cable with minister foreign relations to insist upon government protecting your interest on account of Pierce Oil corporation taking disinterested stand in political affairs Republic of Mexico."

Among the papers is one bearing date of April 20, which is highly illuminating. General Carranza had by that time expressed his willingness to receive the mediation proposals from the diplomatic representatives of the "A B C" governments. The paper referred to bears at the pencilled notation, "To Urquid, to be sent to Fabela." Mr. Urquid is understood to be the secretary of the "constitutionalist confidential agency" at Washington. He is supposed to be a compromise of the Mexican situation at a time when the American government in apparent good faith had accepted the tender of good offices on the part of Argentina, Brazil and Chile looking to mediation which only success in accomplishing the pacification of Mexico could be through a compromise.

Mr. Lind is reported as saying that the president hesitated to raise the embargo while mediation negotiations were pending, and also as saying: "That it meanwhile were perturbed (munitions of war) exported from the United States to Cuba for transport to Mexico, and that the coast of Texas and Louisiana in schooner, he would be placed in the way by Washington."

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Limit for Payment of Income Tax Will Expire Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Tomorrow is the final day for the payment of income tax assessments and internal revenue collections throughout the United States are working day and night now handling the payments of corporations and individuals who have waited almost until the last moment in order to hold on to their money as long as possible.

On July 10 a penalty of 5 per cent will attach to unpaid assessments and for every additional month of delay the penalty will be 1 per cent. This penalty cannot be waived by the secretary of the treasury nor by any Treasury department official, and will be imposed in all cases excepting upon the estates of insane, deceased or insolvent persons.

For the present the commissioner of internal revenue is giving no attention to fraudulent returns, although much information is reaching the department every day concerning persons who are trying to dodge the income tax. Through anonymous letters and other strange sources tips are received concerning the income of persons, who have failed to make returns or have made inadequate returns. As soon as the receipts from honest returns have been disposed of the commissioner and his assistants will begin their investigation of the dodgers.

Beginning about August 1 in every community an investigation will be made of the incomes of all persons who are supposed to fall within the provisions of the law. One letter received by the commissioner of internal revenue a few days ago gave a detailed statement of a real estate transaction in which three persons earned enormous profits. None of the three men has made an income tax return. The return of a prominent lawyer in an eastern city failed to list retainer fees from a number of corporations whose statements to the Treasury department show the attorney is in their employ and regularly on their salary list. These cases are typical of scores that will be given attention when the time comes.

Publicly attending the failure of the Leimner-Munster banks is held responsible. On Saturday the North Avenue bank paid out \$200,000 and when the doors opened today \$300,000 in currency, loaned by the Continental and Commercial Trust and Savings bank, the largest banking institution in the city, was piled in plain sight to reassure depositors.

President Reynolds of the Continental and Commercial bank stated that the North Avenue bank is perfectly solvent, and that it will be given all the funds necessary to meet the extraordinary and uncalled for drain.

Blue Will Direct Campaign Against Bubonic Plague

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Surgeon General Blue of the public health service will go to New Orleans to take charge of the campaign against the bubonic plague which has appeared there. One death has already been recorded.

After receipt of telegrams today from Oscar Dowling, president of the Louisiana Board of Health, the Treasury department ordered the surgeon general to take charge of the situation. Dowling reported bacteriological confirmation of two cases. The public health service, however, will make its own examination.

Surgeon General Blue said today that neither the city of New Orleans nor the territory surrounding it was in any danger, but that it was advisable that the federal government take sharp measures. Apparatus for rat catching and fumigation are being sent to New Orleans and a corps of experts in plague eradication, including Surgeon Creel of the public health service, will carry out the surgeon general's plans.

As a precautionary measure to prevent the spread of the infection by shipping, Surgeon General Blue today sent warnings to health authorities of the Atlantic coast states and to those of the Mississippi river states, as far north as Iowa, suggesting that they take up the work of rodent eradication actively.

Three suspicious cases have been discovered in Santiago, Cuba, and infections continue to be reported from Hanaya. No new deaths, however, are reported from there. With infections being reported from ports along the Spanish Main public health officials are setting in motion all available machinery to prevent its introduction into seaboard cities of the United States.

Thousand Persons Safely Taken from Stranded Steamer

LONDON, June 29.—The 1,014 passengers on board the Anchor liner California, which went ashore during last night on Tory island during a dense fog, were successfully transferred today to the Donaldson liner Cassandra, and a small coasting steamer, without loss of life.

The crews of several British torpedo boat destroyers assisted in transferring the passengers.

The California lies in a precarious position on the rocky coast but it is expected it will be floated as soon as fine weather sets in. Its crew remains on board, although the water has penetrated three of its water holds. Three hundred of the passengers of the California, whose destination was Ireland, were landed here this morning.

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House Passes Bill Intended to Prevent Cotton Gambling

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The Lever bill, designed to eliminate gambling features in cotton exchanges, was passed by the house today, 84 to 23.

The Lever bill is a substitute for the Smith bill that passed the senate. The senate bill would prohibit the use of the mails for contracts that do not meet the conditions of standard grades and commercial differences. That is not in the Lever bill. The senate bill would not tax contracts for future delivery. The house bill levies a tax of 1 cent a pound on all contracts for future delivery that do not meet standard grades and commercial grades as set out in the bill. This tax of 1 cent a pound is intended to be prohibitory, amounting to \$50 a contract.

There are a number of other provisions on dealing in cotton futures designed to eliminate practices on the New York and New Orleans exchanges.
