The Burlington's crop report is made up from data ending last Saturday night and shows that the wheat harvest is well along over the entire country south of the Platte and is in progress farther morth. In the extreme south part of the state threshing has commenced and, according to the report, east of Oxford the yield is from twenty-five to forty bushe's per acre, while west of there and over branches in northern and western Kanzes. it is turning out from fitteen to twentyfive bushels, the quality being most excel-
