LIND'S ACTS COME TO LIGHT CIVIL TRIAL FOR Adviser of Administration Playing

Into Carranza's Hands. CAPTAIN HOPKINS' VIEW OF IT

Regarded Close Mouthed Man from Minnesota as Giving Tip on Shipment of Arms-Embargo Not an Embargo.

NEW YORK, June 30 .- (Special Telegram.) - Captain Hopkins quoted Mr. Lind as asserting that Mr. Wilson "hesitated to raise the embargo (on arms) at this time while mediation negotiations were pending," but that he, Lind, could give assurances that if arms were taken in by schooners from Cuba, "no obstacles would be placed in the way by Washington." This alone would seem to warrant congressional enquiry, since it places the Wilson administration in the position of playing fast and loose in the matter of importation of arms.—New York Evening Post editorial commenting upon the Mexican revelations.

PRESIDENT TELLS WOMEN SUFFRAGE IS A STATE ISSUE

Not National Matter, and So He Can't Use Influence for Passage of Constitutional Amendment.

HE IS PLACED UPON THE GRILL

Asserts He Cannot Permit Himself to Be Cross-Examined as Leader Begins to Quiz Him.

Delegation Files Out of White House Expressing Disappointment.

WASHINGTON, June 30 .- President Wilson told a deputation of more than 500 women suffragists at the White House today that woman suffrage was a state issue and not a national one, and for that reason he would not use his influence for the passage of a constitutionalist amend-

ment in congress. ni the historic East room of the executive mansion the president received the suffragists, who represented the organized club women of nearly every state.

When the president declined to support the Mondell-Bristow amendment, which comes up for a vote in the house rules committee tomorrow, some of the leaders began to put him through a sharp crossexamination, which the president took good-naturedly.

Mrs. Rheta Childe Dorr and Mrs. Harvey W. Wiley quustioned him on his at-titude with respect to other national issues and after several of their queries, the president declared: "I cannot permit myself to be cross-
