WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.

The weather was favorable for harvesting in the winter wheat belt, which is about completed in Kansas and well under way in the Ohio valley and as far north as Iowa. Threshing began under favorable conditions in southern portion of the belt and the yield is generally satisfactory. Good growing weather prevailed in the spring wheat belt, with a few reports of too rapid growth. Sunshine and drier weather is now needed. The weather was favorable for cutivating corn in all districts, except the more northern states, where rain delayed farm work and flooded lowlands. Corn generally is making satisfactory growth, except suffering from lack of moisture in portions of the Ohio valley southward, and southern portions of western belt, especially Arkansas and Missouri. Oats and hay are short in the Ohio valley and southward, but are generally good in the north and west. Much tobacco remains unset on account of dry weather.
