FOUR KILLED AS BOMB EXPLODES

Dead and Those Escaping Injury in Apartment Include Defendants in Tarrytown Case.

MOST POWERFUL USED IN CITY

As Far as Two Blocks from the Wrecked Structure Persons Are Thrown Down by the Shock.

NEW YORK, July 5.-Three men and a woman were killed today when a dynamite bomb, said to be the most powerful ever used in this city, exploded with tre-mendous force in an apartment tenanted by Industrial Workers of the World. The upper part of the six-story tenement house in which the bomb was being made, was wrecked.

A score of persons were seriously injured and much property damage was done in a wide radius from the scene of the explosion.

Those dead and those who escaped injury in the apartment included Industrial Workers of the World men who were defendants in the trial to be begun Mon-day in Tarrytown, N. Conferences at Night.

The cross examination late today disclosed that all the eleven defendants, who are out on bail, met here last night with Alexander Berkman, anarchist, and others at the headquarters of the Francisco Ferrer school, to devise a way to aid the persons facing trial Monday. The conferees included leaders of the so-called anti-militarist league, which seeks to discourage workmen from joining the state national guard.

Present at this meeting, according to statements to the authorities, were Carl Hansen, a member of the staff of Mother Earth, and Carl Berg. 24, a carpenter, one of the Tarrytown defendants, Hansen was blown to pieces in the explosion. Part of his body was found on a church roof and part on car tracks in the street. Berg is missing and is counted among the victims. The other person known to have been killed was Mary Claves, 65 years old, a cigar maker, who occupied an apartment adjoining the one in which the explosion occurred. What Search Disclosed.

In support of the police theory that a

bomb was being made for use in Tarrytown, a search of Caron's apartments disclosed two dry batteries wired for use; a loaded revolver, cartridges and a partly constructed black jack, together with a bowl of yellow substance thought to have been used in bomb construction.

Statements to the police indicated that the group at the Fancisco Ferrer school disbanded about midnight last night. Caron, Hansen, Berg and a fourth man,

Mike Auspenti, who came here from Chicago about two weeks ago, left together and went to the apartment where the explosion occurred at 1626 Lexingon avenue, between 102nd and 103rd street on the upper east side.

Hansen's half sister, Miss Louise Berger, who rented the top floor apartment occupied by herself, Hansen and Caron told the inquisitors that the four (Continued on Page Two.)

BODY OF AN UNIDENTIFIED MAN FOUND NEAR TRACK



IRELAND DIVIDED INTO TWO HOSTILE ARMED FACTIONS

Many Think Prospect of Bitter Civil War Presents Best Safeguard for Peace.

NATIONALIST ARMY GROWING

Number of Men Enlisted is Estimated All the Way from Eighty Thousand to Quarter Million.

LACK ARMS AND EQUIPMENT Home Rue Sympathizers in America

Expected to Furnish Funds. COVENANTERS NOT ALARMED

Ulater Volunteers Are Saturated with Military Spurt and are Anxious for Action-Force is Well Organized and Well Armed.

LONDON, July 5.-With every week of suspense in the settlement of the future government of Ireland, the menace of the military preparations by the Ulster and the Home Rule volunteers increases. The present tendency among the volunteers of the south is to accept leadership by the nationalist party which John Redmond offered them. Thus led, there would be a clear division of Home Rulers and anti-Home Rule men into hostile armed camps. The very dangers of a bitter civil war which such a prospect presents, furnishes the best safeguard

for peace. Correspondents of the Associated Press at Dublin and Belfast have written of the situation from the nationalist and Ulster points of view, respectively. The most interesting development is the plan, hitherto tapublished, of the Orangemen under Sir Edward Carson for taking charge of affairs by force if a provisional government is set up, and the fact that the commercial men of Belfast have used their influence in Ulster councils to postpone radical action until a Home Rule parliament has been established in Dublin.
