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LEARNS THE GAME IN OMAHA

Winner in Sioux City Race Once an Automobile Driver in This City.

FINISH SOMEWHAT SPECTACULAR

Rickenbacher's Tire Blows Up and He Drives Home on the Bare Rim of One of Wheels of Machine.

Two minutes isn't much, but it was all there was to it at the finish of the 300-mile race at Sioux City Saturday. It was by that brief margin that Eddie Rickenbacher drove his Deussenberg across the line winner ahead of Spencer Wishart, who finished second, driving a Mercer.

Rickenbacher learned the fundamentals of the racing game while selling Firestone-Columbus machines in Omaha and won about nine out of every ten prizes at the races held at the Omaha speedway just west of Elmwood park a couple of years ago.

Finishes on Bare Rim. Coming down the stretch at over eighty miles an hour Rickenbacher was but thirty yards from the finish line when his right hand rear tire burst and was flung forty feet in the air, but the former Omaha boy clung tightly to his wheel, prevented his machine from skidding clear around by a masterful twist and saved over the finish line and made his extra lap on the bare rim. It was a fitting climax to a wonderful race, and many a driver would have been unable to stand the pressure.

Winners Leads for 100 Miles. Rickenbacher took the lead at 200 miles, being just two minutes ahead of Wishart at this distance. From that time on Rickenbacher and Wishart ran neck and neck, each maintaining about the same speed, and they finished with the two minutes time between them.
