

TIGERS TRIM MACKS TWICE

Detroit Piles Up Six Runs in First Frame of Opener.

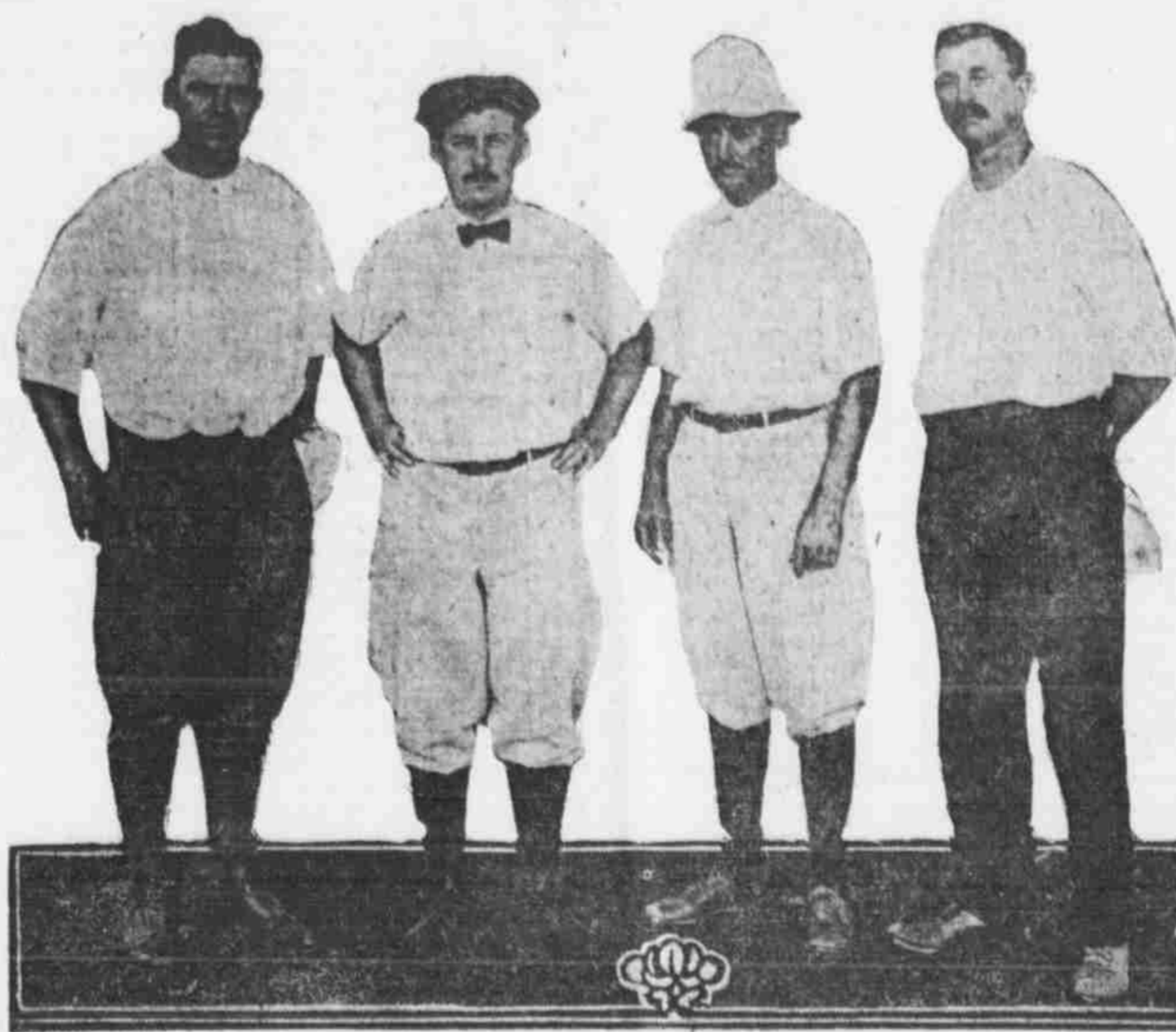
