FIFTH SUICIDE IN ONE FAMILY William Beidler Takes Carbolic Acid at Home of Aunt.

FOUR OTHERS PRECEDE HIM Mother and Three Sisters Take Own Lives During the Last Twenty Years—Insanity Assigned as the Reason.

William Beidler, 22 years old, of Council Bluffs, committed suicide yesterday by drinking ten ounces of carbolic acid at the home of an aunt, Mrs. Amanda Beidler, 304 Fourth avenue. He is the fifth of his family to succumb to the suicide mania.

Twenty years ago his mother, Mrs. William Beidler, hanged herself. His sister, Amanda Beidler, shot herself twenty years ago. Mittie Beidler, another sister, committed suicide eighteen years ago. A third sister, Mrs. J. Harris, hanged herself in Council Bluffs three years ago.
