Red Cloud Man Enters Race for Lieutenant Governor.

MARTIN ON ELECTION BOARD

Attorney General Rules that District Clerk May Say What Parties May Be Represented.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, July 10.—(Special.)—The flock of aspirants for the republican nomination for lieutenant-governor still increases. This morning the filing of L. P. Albright of Red Cloud reached the office of the secretary of state.

In a letter to one of the state officers Mr. Albright says that he came to Nebraska in 1877. He has served as bank examiner under Governor Aldrich and served two terms as president of the State Sunday School association. He has attended twenty-two conventions as a republican delegate. He believes the time is ripe for a republican victory.

District Clerk Supreme. From an opinion by Attorney General Martin made to County Attorney Michael E. Cowan of Johnson county the clerk of the district court of each county has full authority in the assignment of judges and clerks of election as regards political designation.

The question has arisen in other places on the proposition on account of the split in the republican party in 1912 which resulted in the formation of a third or bullmoose party. According to the attorney general the vote of president cuts no figure in the selection of judges and clerks.

Maher Proposes Suffrage Debate in Three Places

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, July 10.—(Special.)—Now that Colonel John G. Maher has been forced to abandon his idea of running for governor, the valiant colonel has turned his eagle eye on the suffragists and from now on there will be no peace until capitulate to the forces of Colonel Maher of the colonel is driven ingloriously into the swamp of despond and is drowned in the whirl of despair.

Colonel Maher has dictated a letter to Mrs. Viola M. Harrison, secretary of the equal suffrage league of the state, in which he says, after a long introduction: "Something less than three months remains before this question is to be decided at the polls. This people have a right to be informed upon this, as upon all public questions, and with that end in view, I take pleasure in submitting the following proposition:

Those who are in favor of granting equal suffrage, preferably your organization, to provide a supporter of the proposition, those of us who oppose it to provide an opponent; these two to meet in joint debate of the subject in not less than three cities of Nebraska, two of which shall be Omaha and Lincoln, the third to be mutually agreed upon. It is understood that the principals in this debate shall be recognized representatives of their respective sides. I will gladly undertake to provide, without expense to your organization, for all of the expenses of the Lincoln meeting—hall rent, general advertising, etc., and believe there will be no trouble in arranging for similar expense in Omaha without calling on your organization.

TEACHER CHARGED WITH ATTACKING GIRL PUPIL

AUBURN, Neb., July 10.—(Special.)—A complaint was filed in the county court charging Arthur L. Roberts with assault last January upon Ivey Hendricks of Brock, a girl sixteen years of age. Roberts was arrested and gave bond. Roberts for two years has been the principal of the Johnson schools, and just previous was for one year principal of the public schools at Brock, and the girl was one of the pupils and graduated out of the eighth grade this spring. It is alleged that an operation was performed by some doctor at Lincoln the first of the month. The girl is very sick and for several days it was thought she could not live. Roberts was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. A preliminary hearing is not possible for several weeks because of the girl's illness.

PAWNEE CITY SELLS FUNDING BONDS TO STATE

PAWNEE CITY, July 10.—(Special.)—The municipal issue of \$33,000 worth of funding bonds was taken to Lincoln yesterday for registry by the state auditor. The issue, which consists of sixty-six \$500 bonds, to run twenty years, optional after ten, and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent, was sold to the state. The bonds will fund outstanding warrants and other bonds on which the city is now paying higher interest, and will save the city \$600 in interest yearly.

BEATRICE, Neb., July 10.—(Special.)—Colonel E. J. Shinn arrived home Thursday from a nice month's trip to Europe. Mrs. Shinn, who accompanied him, stopped off in New York for a visit with relatives before returning home.

Fred Elwood, a farmer living about four miles southeast of Beatrice, finished cutting his oats over Thursday, which he thinks will yield fifty bushels to the acre. Mr. Elwood and his brother-in-law have 150 acres in wheat and he estimates that he will secure a yield of from eighteen to twenty bushels.

Mrs. Mabel M. McDaniels of this city has brought suit in the district court for a divorce from Roscoe McDaniels on the grounds of nonsupport. McDaniels is now employed in a restaurant at Grand Island and was an outfielder for the Beatrice team in the old Mink league.

William Scanton died Thursday morning at his home at Pickrell of hemorrhage of the lungs, aged 56 years. He had been engaged in farming near that place for fifteen years, but he retired two years ago on account of failing health.

HOWELL OUT FOR GOVERNOR

Tells Former Speaker Mockett He Will Try for Nomination.

FRIENDS FILED FOR HIM

Mockett Says He Has Acceptance in Writing and that It Will Be Filled in Lincoln on Saturday.

R. Beecher Howell, Water board boss, has decided to listen to the appeals of his friends and to become a candidate for the republican nomination for governor.

The adamant attitude of R. Beecher Howell, who declared he would not run for governor and turned down petition circulators with a cruel wave of the hand, brought John H. Mockett of Lincoln, former speaker of the house, scurrying to Omaha to get a first-hand answer from the Water board boss.

Original Howell Boosters. Mr. Mockett was the original Howell booster and saw that petitions were circulated for him and that his name was filed so that he could be a candidate before the primaries, August 15, if he so desired.

Some time ago Mr. Howell issued a statement in which he declined to run for governor, saying he had "work to do in Omaha."

Mr. Mockett called at The Bee office and announced that he had the acceptance of Mr. Howell of the filing made by his friends and that he would file it with the secretary of state at Lincoln Saturday morning.

Refusal of Frank Johnson to pay his mother's funeral expenses and the threat of the undertaker to exhumate the body unless the expense of the burial was paid were two of the reasons why Mrs. Lizzie Johnson applied for divorce, she told District Judge James P. English. Judge English granted the divorce.

Mrs. Johnson said her husband, a former city fireman, shamefully neglected his marital duties. She said, however, that he must have paid the expense attending his mother's burial, as to the best of her knowledge, the body had not been removed from the grave. The mother died a little over a year ago.

Mrs. Johnson, in her petition for divorce, alleged desertion among other things. Her sister was corroborating witness.
