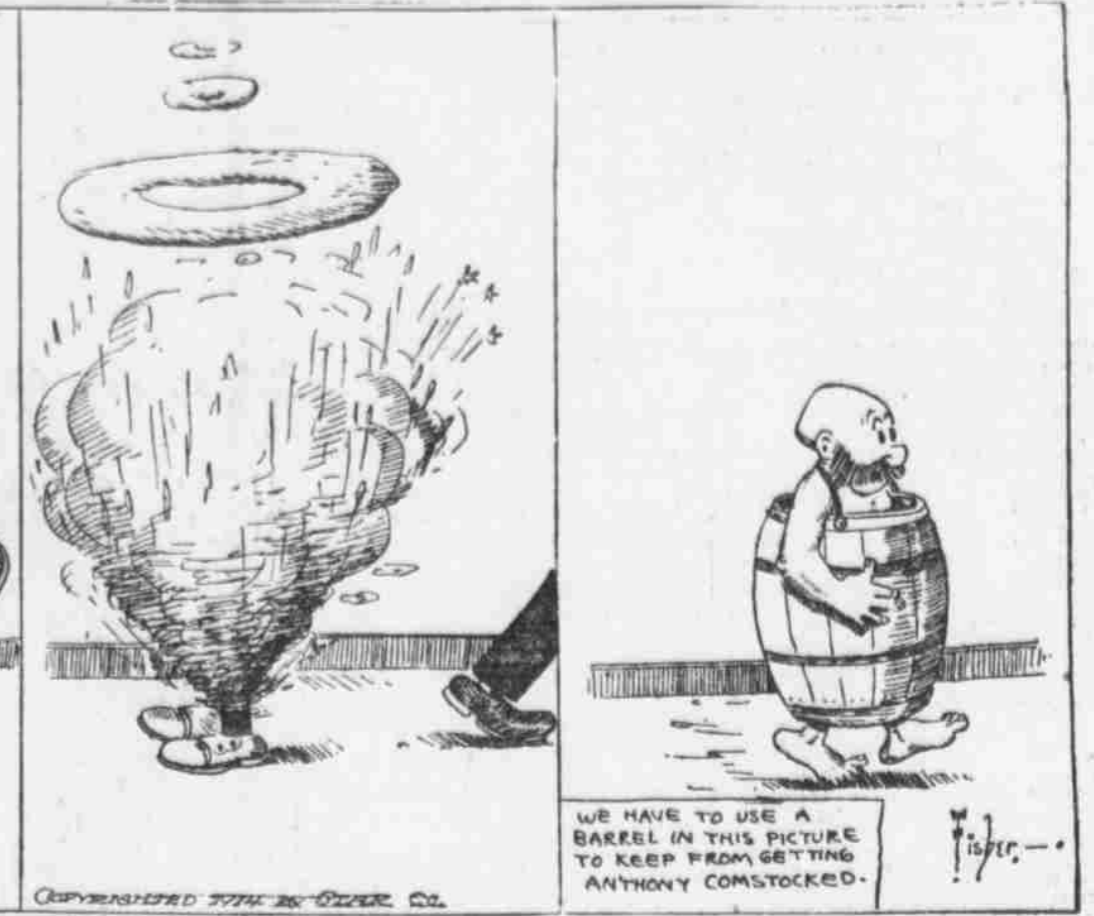
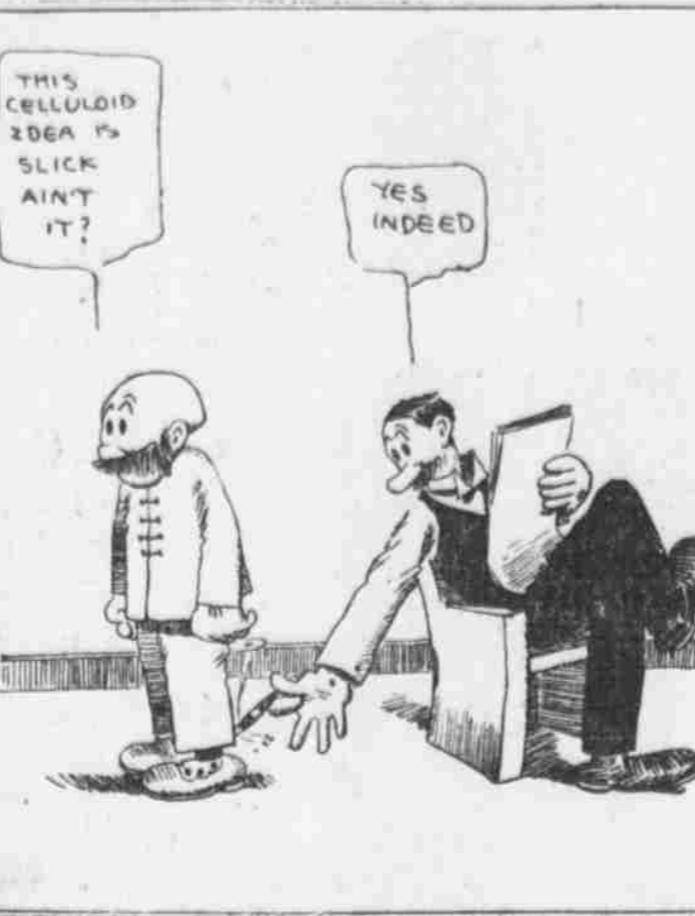
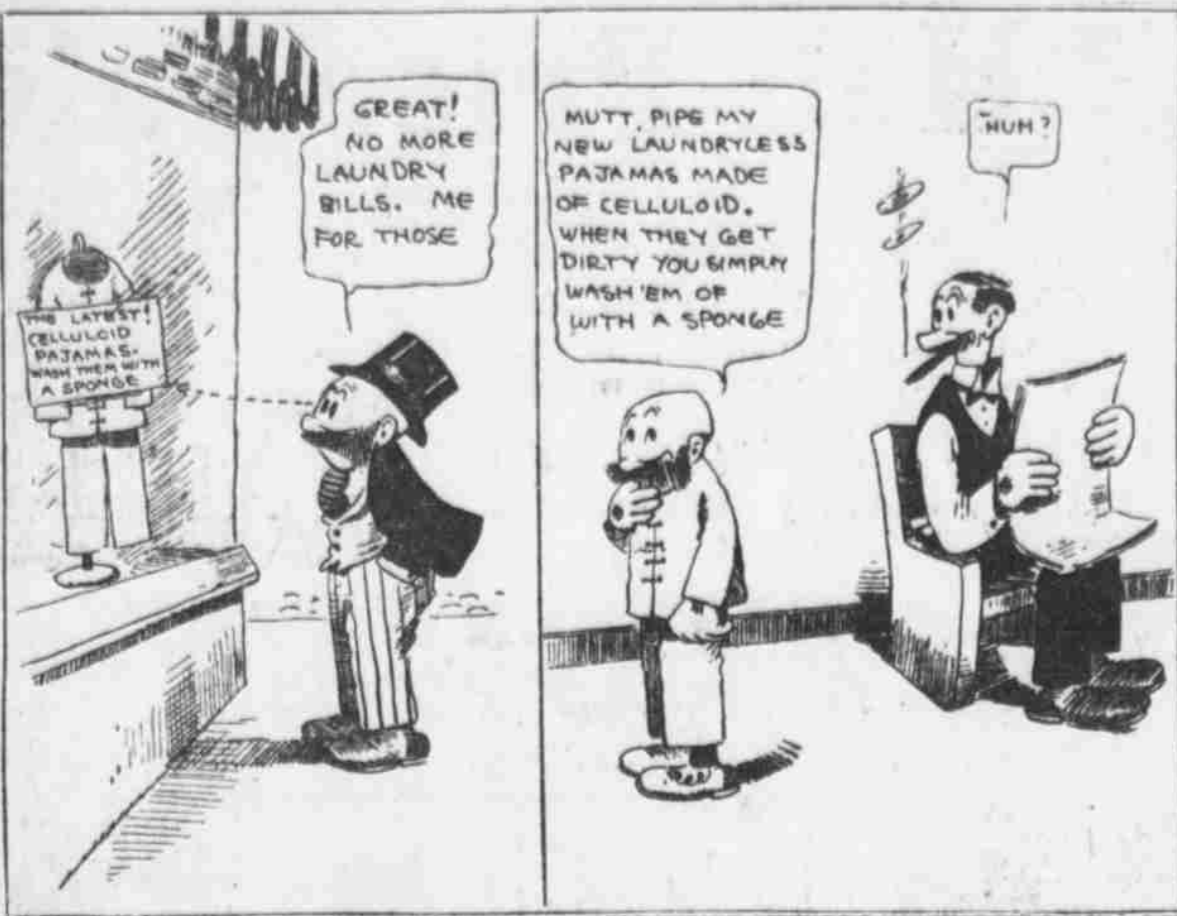


It Was a Mean Trick for Mutt to Play on a Little Man

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Fastest Bunch of Racers Speed at Fremont Track

Fremont, Neb., July 10.—(Special Telegram.)—The closing day of the races brought out about the fastest bunch of horses ever seen on any race track in Nebraska.
