ENGLISH FILES FOR JUDGE

Becomes Candidate to Succeed Self in Fourth District.

MISS DAY WILL NOT MAKE RACE

Member of Staff of State Superintendent's Office Decides Not to Be Candidate for Superintendent of Gage County.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, July 11.—(Special Telegram.)—James P. English of Omaha, has filed a petition with the secretary of state, asking that his name be placed upon the non-partisan ballot as a candidate for district judge for the fourth judicial district.

Judge English was appointed to the position of district judge by Governor Ames to fill the vacancy made by the appointment of District Judge Howard Kennedy as a member of the State Board of Control.

The petition of Judge English contains 6,270 names. Charles Naylor of Chadron, county clerk of Daves county, has filed for the democratic nomination for representative for the Seventy-fourth district, composed of the counties of Daves and Sioux, represented in the last session by H. E. Reische of Chadron, a democrat.

Holdrege Bank Changes.

The Holdrege State bank has changed to a state bank with a capital of \$40,000. The bank was formerly a national bank under the name of the City National bank, with a capital of \$80,000. F. W. Kiplinger is president of the new bank. L. Brown and J. A. Slater, vice presidents, and F. A. Dean, cashier.

Looking After Fences.

Frank Edgerton, assistant attorney general, is in the wilds of Richardson county, looking after some of his political fences, which it is reported Frank Reavis has been trying to demolish during the last few days. Next Monday Crawford Kennedy will strike out through that section of the country so that the people down there will have a chance to see what a real congressman looks like. Crawford says that it is getting good reports from all over the district regarding his canvass and is very sanguine over his ability to land the nomination to represent the republicans of the district as their candidate for congress.

Miss Day Will Not Run.

Miss Anna V. Day of the state superintendent's office, who has been considering accepting the nomination for county superintendent of Gage county on the republican ticket, a petition having been circulated for that purpose, has decided that she will not run for the position and has so notified the petitioners.

Investigates Raspberry Pie.

State Chemist Reider, who went to Peru to investigate the cases of supposed ptomaine poisoning at the normal school, returned this morning, coming to the conclusion that the cases were intestinal poisoning. Eleven girls were taken ill after eating raspberry pie, purchased from a restaurant in that city. One girl was taken with convulsions. Investigation could bring out no evidence that the pie was made from berries which were stale, although all who had partaken of the pie suffered from the poisoning. The woman who made the pies and her son testified that the pies were made from fresh berries.

Stevens of Fremont Files for Governor

LINCOLN, Neb., July 11.—(Special Telegram.)—Republicans of Nebraska will have an opportunity to select from a large force of candidates for the republican nomination for governor if the entries in the race continue to come in with the rapidity of the last few days. With John O. Yeiser of Omaha, J. H. Kemp of Pullerton, Ross L. Hammond of Fremont and R. B. Howell of Omaha in the race, John Stevens of Beaver City filed this morning and there are yet nearly ten days left for others to get in. Mr. Stevens informs Secretary of State Wait in a letter accompanying his filing that if anyone wants to know what he stands for he can tell them that he is for county option to be followed by state wide prohibition and woman suffrage. He is in favor of university removal, but does not think it should be made a party issue. Mr. Stevens was a member of the legislature of 1891 and was known as one of the radical populists of that session.

Republicans Meet in Utmost Harmony

LINCOLN, Neb., July 11.—(Special Telegram.)—The much-talked-about meeting of the two factions of the republican party, which democrats and bullmooses had been willing to bet their coin would result in a knockdown and dragout affair, was the most harmonious political meeting ever held in the city.

The Epperson committee met in the Security Mutual building and the Currie committee in the Lindell hotel. In the former meeting the resignation of Chairman G. A. Adams, who had gone over to the Currie party, was accepted and in the latter meeting Judge E. P. Holmes resigned as chairman. Then each committee appointed a committee of five to confer and the result was that both committees gathered at the Lindell hotel, over 100 strong, elected Elliott Lowe, chairman, and Ed Magri, secretary, and the organization then elected L. J. Dunn chairman of the county committee and Ed D. Beach, a traveling man, secretary.

The county convention will be held a week from today. Everybody is enthusiastic over the result of the meeting.

Ranchmen Looking to a Good Season

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, July 11.—(Special.)—Land Commissioner Fred Beckman has just returned from an inspection of school lands up in the sand hills and is very enthusiastic over the outlook there for prosperity.

The grass is of an abundant growth and hay will run from a ton to a ton and a half per acre. Most of the trip had to be made by team, as the country is so sandy that an auto would not make good time through the hills.

Commissioner Beckman drove from "Whitman out" to Pullman, about thirty-five miles, where he changed teams to several ranches in the vicinity, covering about 100 miles on the trip. Cattle are looking fine and calves are contracted for before their birth at \$30 a head to be delivered at the close of the grazing season. Three-year-old steers are sold for from \$65 to \$90 a head.

Everything is looking fine, according to the commissioner, and the ranchmen are looking forward to a money-making season.

CALLAWAY, Neb., July 11.—(Special Telegram.)—J. P. Peterson was overcome by the heat yesterday, while working on the streets. For a time it was thought he could not survive. He received medical attention at once and now is on the road to recovery.

Commerce Bureau Issues Statement

WASHINGTON, July 11.—In connection with "The recent phenomenon of an excess of imports over exports in April and May," the Department of Commerce, in a statement today on the commerce of trade, announced that the net export balance of the United States probably would exceed \$400,000,000 for the current fiscal year. This would be about \$250,000,000 less than last year's balance.

The department pointed out that a large proportion of the older and more advanced nations show an excess of imports over exports of merchandise. Canada shows a balance on the import side, but nearly all other American countries show larger exports.

INSANE MAN TAKEN TO SCENE OF AXE MURDERS

CHICAGO, July 11.—Peter Buchankow, an escaped patient from the asylum at Kankakee, today dropped to his knees and mumbling a prayer crossed himself repeatedly beside a bed in Blue Island, where two women and a child were murdered with an axe on Sunday night. A man also was killed in the house. The insane man, who is suspected of the murders then fled from the house and fought all attempts to take him back.

FRANCE LIFTS LICENSE TAX ON WINE AND BEER

PARIS, July 11.—In an effort to discourage drunkenness in France, the Chamber of Deputies today voted the abolition of the license tax on saloon-keepers except in regard to distilled liquors. It has been found by the authorities that the tax had a tendency to restrict the sales of the more wholesome wines, beers and ciders in favor of spirits.

Hall County Endorses Barton and Opposes Plan of One Candidate Running on More Than One Ticket.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) PULLERTON, Neb., July 11.—(Special Telegram.)—One of the largest and most harmonious county conventions was held this afternoon in this city by the republicans of this county.

The following resolution was adopted unanimously by the convention: Whereas, our esteemed fellow citizen, J. H. Kemp has filed for the office of governor of the state of Nebraska, therefore be it

Resolved, By the republicans of Nance county in convention assembled, that we most heartily endorse the candidacy of J. H. Kemp; that we recognize in him all the splendid qualities, which would make him an ideal candidate for chief executive of this commonwealth.
