

LOCAL GRAIN STOCKS LOW

Over Half Million Less Than Corresponding Date Last Year.

BIG DEMAND FOR NEW CROP

Nebraska Wheat is Being Rapidly Bought Up by Representatives from Half a Dozen Milling Centers.

Grain stocks in storage in Omaha elevators are more than 500,000 bushels less than on the corresponding date of last year, but from now on they are expected to increase and if prices remain down, it is expected that before the end of the month elevators will be pretty well filled.

The following shows the stocks of hand now and on the corresponding date of last year:

Receipts for Day. Grain receipts at Omaha Tuesday were: Wheat, forty-five; corn, ninety, and oats, thirty-two carloads. The corn and oats went into storage, though little of the wheat remained longer than to be sold, transferred and switched. The outside demand for the Nebraska wheat, owing to its superior milling qualities is constantly growing in demand. Buyers from half a dozen milling centers are here and are buying in and shipping out the cereal about as rapidly as it comes into the market.

CHISAM WRITES NUT CROP WHOPPER THIS YEAR

Assistant General Freight Agent Chisam of the Great Western railroad, now in southern California on his annual vacation and who is the owner of one of the large walnut groves there, one that has been netting him \$2,000 to \$3,000 annually for several years, writes that prospects for a big walnut crop this year are the best.

Mr. Chisam estimates the walnut crop this year at 10,500 tons and asserts that prices will be higher this year than last, due to the fact that the crop of Europe and Manchuria is almost a total failure.

The quality, too, he says, will be better than last. Last year 28 per cent of the nuts were No. 1 and the estimate is that this year not to exceed 6 per cent will be of that grade. This year the nuts are fully 35 per cent larger than last.

STENGER OF ST. JOSEPH ROAD SEES GOOD BUSINESS

Ernest Stenger, general manager of the St. Joseph & Grand Island railroad, is in town, in conference with officials of the Union Pacific. Mr. Stenger sees a good business ahead for the St. Joseph road, an enormous small grain crop having been harvested in all the territory tributary.

Just when the segregation of the St. Joe and the Union Pacific roads will occur, the general manager of the former is unable to state. He has made no arrangements looking to separation, owing to the Union Pacific having appealed from the federal court decision, ordering that the St. Joe become an independent line.

THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS SEEKING SUMMER WORK

Young preachers, missionaries and theological students are quite numerous in Omaha this summer, according to A. A. Remington, employment secretary of the Young Men's Christian association, whom they have asked for temporary work.

Some of the embryonic religious workers desire work for only half of each day, so that they can do stum or mission work the remainder of the time. Others want clerical work, soliciting or similar employment to do for the summer, until their college or seminary resumes its courses in the fall.
