BRYAN FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Secretary Makes Formal Statement of His Attitude.

WILL VOTE FOR IT THIS FALL

He Says Woman Has Proved Equal to Every Responsibility and Will Not Fall Society in This Emergency.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Secretary Bryan, in a formal statement issued tonight came out for woman suffrage. He declared that he would ask no political right for himself, that he was not willing to grant his wife, and announced his intention of supporting the proposed state constitutional amendment extending the franchise to women to be voted upon in Nebraska next November.

Why Mothers Are Interested.
As for myself, I am not in doubt as to my duty. It is not my purpose to discuss the subject with elaboration at this time, but I desire to present the argument to which I give the greatest weight. Without minimizing other arguments advanced in support of the extending of suffrage to woman I place the emphasis upon the mother's right to a vote in moulding the environment which shall surround her children—an environment which operates powerfully in determining whether her offspring will crown her later years with joy or bring down her gray hairs in sorrow to the grave."

Would Aid Peace Movement.
The first objection which I remember to have heard was that as woman cannot bear arms she should not have a voice in deciding questions that might lead to war, or enacting laws that might require an army for their enforcement. This argument is seldom offered now for the reason that as civilization advances laws are obeyed because they are an expression of the public opinion, not merely because they have power and lead behind them. And as we look back over the past we may well wonder whether the peace movement would not have grown more rapidly than it has had woman, who suffers more than man from the results of war, been consulted before hostilities began.

Works Well in Other States.
And are not the second and third objections above stated refuted, to some extent at least, by the fact that in the states which have adopted woman's suffrage (and in the other nations that have adopted it) there is no agitation to return to the situation on which man has a monopoly of the right to vote. Is it not fair to presume an effort would be made to correct the mistake if woman's suffrage had really failed to give satisfaction to the people where it has been tried?

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of the controversy to take he would be justified in giving weight to the fact that organization and enthusiasm are on the side of those who favor woman's suffrage. Organization is an evidence of earnestness, as well as of a comprehension of the subject. People do not associate themselves together to secure a given end until they have reached a definite conclusion in regard to its desirability and feel that its accomplishment is worth the effort for which it calls. It is quite evident that those who disinterestedly desire woman's suffrage are willing to make greater sacrifices to secure it than those who disinterestedly oppose woman's suffrage are willing to make to prevent it.

raising a child, it seems impossible that anyone would attempt to lead a child astray or rob its parents of the priceless reward to which they are entitled; and yet there are in every generation—aye, in every community—those who are inhuman enough to deliberately lie in wait to make a wreckage of the lives of young men and women. They lay snares for them; they set traps for them; and the men who ply this ghastly trade for gain are allowed to use the ballot to advance their pecuniary interests. I am not willing to stay the mother's hand if she thinks that by the use of suffrage she can safeguard the welfare of those who are dearer to her than her own life.

Politics will not suffer by woman's entrance into it. If the political world has grown more sane in spite of the evil influences that have operated to delude it, it will not be polluted by the presence and participation of woman. Neither should we doubt that woman can be trusted with the ballot. She has proven herself equal to every responsibility imposed upon her; she will not fall society in this emergency. Let her vote and may that government which has throughout the ages ever enabled her to quickly grasp great truths—made her "the last at the cross and the first at the sepulchre"—so direct her in the discharge of her political duties as to add new glories to her and through her still further bless society."

that solemn promise. You all know the immense difficulties which my government has encountered owing to a scarcity of funds, as well as to the manifest and decided protection which a great power of this continent has afforded to the rebels—so much so that when the revolution had been broken up, seeing that its chief leaders were and continued to be divided, the power in question sought a pretext to intervene directly in the conflict, and the result of this was the outrage committed at Vera Cruz by the American fleet.

Success was had, as you know, in adjusting honorably, through our delegates at Niagara Falls, the petty Tampico incident, but the revolution continued with the support of whom we all know.

After the highest patriotic work achieved by our delegates at Niagara Falls, there are still some who say that I seek my personal interest and not that of the republic. And as I need to refute this allegation with facts, I tender my formal resignation of the presidency of the republic.

The national congress must know that the republic, through its government, has labored in entire good faith and with the fullest energy, having succeeded in staving away with the party, which in the United States calls itself democratic, and having shown how the right should be defended.

To be more explicit I will say that the action of the government of the republic during its short life has dealt death blows to an unjust power. Later on, stronger workers will come, using implements that undoubtedly will end that power, which has done so much harm and committed so many outrages on this continent.

Arraigns Honor of Puritan.
In conclusion I will say that I abandon the presidency of the republic, carrying with me the highest sum of human wealth, for I declare that I have arraigned at the bar of universal conscience the honor of a Puritan, whom I, as a gentleman, challenge to wrest from me that possession.

the fratricidal strife.
General Aureliano Blanquet, Huerta's minister of war, several other generals and the ministers of communications, public instructions and interior in the Huerta cabinet, Arturo Alvarado, Garcia Naranjo, Ignacio Alcocer, respectively, as well as other high officials of the former administration, left the capital this afternoon.

Committee to See Rebels.
A special committee composed of Jesus Uretia, Enrique Borden Mangels and Jose Ines Novelo, former members of the chamber of deputies, left tonight to arrange with the constitutionalist leaders for a peaceful entry into the capital.

It was reported that General Huerta was preparing to leave for Europe. The members of his family through Cordoba, this afternoon on the way to Puerto Mexico.

The streets of the capital were crowded until a late hour tonight, but no disturbance has been reported. The governor of the federal district issued orders to the police to check every demonstration vigorously. The streets are patrolled by mounted police, who have orders to use drastic measures if necessary.

Rumors that bands of Zapala followers have reached Zochimilco, ten miles south of the capital, have proved to be unfounded.

Shortly after 8 o'clock tonight, General Huerta, accompanied by a few friends, entered the French cafe which he has been in the habit of visiting several times daily for the past year or more, and took his usual place near the entrance.

An immense crowd followed the ex-president to the cafe, shouting "vivas" for him. Many shook him by the hand while others embraced and several kissed him on the cheek.

The stern old soldier was overcome, and tears filled his eyes. He raised his glass and said: "This will be my last toast in my favorite resort, and I drink to the new president of Mexico."

Crowds Block Streets.
As President Carbajal emerged from the chamber of deputies an immense crowd blocked the streets, making it difficult for the presidential carriage to pass. The troops were obliged to march by the way. The dense crowds issuing from the chamber were momentarily halted, hundreds turning back into the building.

A panic was narrowly averted, the trouble being caused by some man in the street raising a cry against the deputies, who had refused to vote for the acceptance of Huerta's resignation. The manufacturers showed an ugly disposition and attempted to attack the deputies, but the troops leveled their guns and dispersed them.

Lower California is Insurgent.
DOUGLAS, Ariz., July 16.—General Alvarado telegraphed to Constitutional Agent Leivier here today that the southern district of Lower California had been proclaimed constitutional territory by Amencua, the left politico. La Paz is the capital of the district. The federal garrison at Guaymas already had sent much artillery and spare ammunition to La Paz, believing it would be safe there when Guaymas was evacuated.

Malina Cruz is the only west coast port outside of Mazatlan left open to the federales of Guaymas.
