WICHES GAME IS POSTPONED

No Audience and Rain Preclude Battle Now Set for August.

TOPEKA WILL PLAY TODAY

First of Five-Game Series Will Be Staged in Front of the Ladies by Cooley and Hourke

Copious clouds of threatening nature and a couple of rain drops thrust vivid remembrances of midsummer storms before the eyes of Omaha fans yesterday with the result that the grandstand was barren a few minutes before time to start the fourth game of the series with Wichita. In as much as no fans were there to encourage the athletes an early rain shower appeared on the scene, it was decided to postpone the battle until August. In August, therefore, the bugs will be treated to a double-header.

The Rockies now stand even on the home lot series. Three out of four were topped from the Links and an even break was registered with the Grizzlies and the Wiches tucked away two out of three.

Five battles will be played with Topeka starting today. Today will be ladies' day and the lady bugs will be given an opportunity to see Dick Cooley and his reticent Kansas hands. A double bill will be played Sunday and Roy Sanders of St. Paul will hurl one of the battles. Sanders will just about wallop the Kaws as he is one swell pitcher. He has speed, nifty curve ball, plenty of nerve and good control.

Cooley's First Visit. Dick Cooley is making his first visit to Omaha since he assumed the management of the fallen Kaws. Dick was in Topeka once before and he is welcomed back in all Western league towns except Denver, where Mr. Cooley is somewhat "de trop." Dick is the gent who made Eyrus Cobb, the well known enemy of all butchers, famous. Cooley was the regular right fielder on the Detroit team in 1905, when Ty joined the Tigers. Ty was a modest and unassuming youth in those days and not prone to beat up butcher boys and the like at divers intervals.

One day Ty was seated inconspicuously in the corner of the bench when Cooley announced that he was indisposed and would prefer to remain out of the fray that day. Jennings was not particularly pleased with the idea as he had no one else to substitute for Cooley.

"Who'll I put in your place?" queried Jennings. "Put the kid here in," responded Cooley. Ty was the kid.

CARPENTIER GIVEN DECISION (Continued from Page 9) had not been exaggerated. He showed a left lead like a flash of lightning and a powerful and equally swift right. His footwork was wonderful, and although Smith was remarkably quick for a big man he was noticeably slower than his younger opponent.

Fight by Rounds. Round 1—Smith got two right jabs to the Frenchman's body. In the first clinch, which followed soon, Carpentier gave Smith a hard short-hand drive on the cheek with left. Both dodged right-handers. Smith gave the Frenchman a hard body blow with the right. Each's right and left body blow in infighting were Smith's offerings. Smith's blows were under the Frenchman's, whose footwork had not yet been in evidence.

Round 2—Carpentier took the aggressive, and pressed on Smith's nose. He again ducked a hard right-hander from the other. Smith landed on the kidneys with right in a clinch. Carpentier landed hard on the jaw. Carpentier sent a fast right to the face. Carpentier was playing for the body at short range when the round ended. His lightning quickness was beginning to count.
