

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Selling Character of Wheat Better Than That of Buying. ELEVATOR MEN NOT ALARMED. Both Owners and Farmers in the Spring Wheat Country Not a Bit Anxious as to Possible Losses from Any Cause.

While there were further advances of 1/4c in the Chicago wheat market yesterday, the buying on a report that wheat farmer of the northwest, the selling was considered of a better character than that of the northwest.

George M. LeCount, who is in the spring wheat country in the interest of Finley Barrett & Co., wired that he thought it would be advisable to act with caution on the more sensational black rust reports sent out of the spring wheat country, as some of them were far from actual conditions existing there.

Many of the reports received from the northwest, and which referred to black rust, said that with a change to favorable weather conditions there is a less chance for the advance of the plague. There are few buying orders, accompanying the black rust reports, which led many in the trade, especially the more conservative men, to slow in making new commitments on the buying side.

In the spring wheat country the elevator concerns as well as the farmers are not so alarmed by the possible losses from any cause as the receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth yesterday were 200 cars, against 175 cars and 150 cars a year ago. This freer movement failed to lead one to believe that the holders of the grain in the northwest are at all anxious over crop losses.

The decline of 1/4c in oats today that market was an indication that the holders refused to follow prices in either wheat or corn. Rains may possibly delay harvesting conditions in the northwest.

Hogs were higher at the yards and the run in the west was small. The advance in provisions was not so marked as the market closed firm. Cash trade in meats was fairly good and there was a common demand for September and October ribs. Packers were credited with selling lard and October ribs. Considerable product came to the market in the way of profit taking.
