

# CAILLAUX MADE THREAT TO KILL FIGARO EDITOR

Former President Poincaire in Depesition Says Other Said He Would Slay Calmette.

EX-PREMIER TAKES THE STAND

His Voice Trembles But Gains Composure as He Proceeds.

BOURGET TELLS OF SHOOTING

French Author Testifies in Trial of Mme. Caillaux.

LABORI THRILLS THE CROWD He Reads Passage from Bourget's Book Condemning the Publica-

tion of Heroine's Love Letters. PARIS, July 21.-The most important testimony at the second days' hearing in the trial of Mme. Calllaux for the mur-

der of Gaston Calmette was that of President Poincare, of the republic, whose deposition was taken by Judge Emile Foricion, the first president of the court of appeals This narrated how Joseph Calliaux, then minister of state, had called on Prestdent Poincare on the day Calmette was

killed and had spoken about the probably publication in the Fingara of letters beween himself and Mme. Caillaux. In the course of an excited talk, Mme, Caillaux exclaimed, according to the deposition: "If Calmette publishes the

letters, I will kill him." Joseph Caillaux also took the stand He looked very young to have been Premier of France and chief of the imcortant radical party. After relating incidents of his private life after his marriage with Mme. Gueydan, he explained the circumstances of the writing of the two letters to Mme. Raynouard, who afterward became Mme. Calllaux. His voice trembled and he was obviously ill at ease, but he gathered composure as he preceeded.

Mme. Henriette Cailleux was up at ! o'clock preparing for the second day's hearing. She took an early breakfast and before 8 o'clock was waiting for her husband, who, however, did not call at the prison till between 9 and 10 o'clock, The prisoner and her husband conversed for half an hour and afterward she

lunched. "I feel better than I did yesterday." Mme. Caillaux said to the solicitous prison warden when he inquired today about her health.
