Drummond, now in the east, and Miss Katherine White, now in Chicago, were brought back.

### UNITED STATES IS ASKED TO INSIST ON GUARANTEES

South American Mediators Request Wilson to Obtain Amnesty for Huerta Followers.

CARBAJAL IS READY TO QUIT

He Insists that There Be No Wholesale Executions or Confiscation of Property.

POSITION OF ADMINISTRATION Will Not Recognize Government

that Refuses to Give Quarter. CARBAJAL COMMISSION ON WAY

Rumor that Conference Will Be Held at Salittlo-Hope in Expressed that There Will Be No Bloodshed.

WASHINGTON, July 22-Ambassador Da Gana of Brazil and Ministers Suarez of Chile and Naon of Argentina, the three mediators in the Mexican affair, appealed to President Wilson today to have the United States use its influence with General Carranga to obtain a general amnesty for those who supported the Huerta government.

It was the first formal call of the three mediators since the conference at Niagara. Falls adjourned. They were accompanied by Secretary Bryan and for nearly an our discussed the Mexican situation in all its phases. They expressed the view that Francisco Carbajal was ready to turn over the government to General Carranza, but wanted guarantees that there would be no wholesale executions, ar-

ests or confiscation of property. They told President Wilson that Carsajal would not surrender unconditionally and that unless these guarantees for the protection of the lives and property of those who supported Huerta were given would concentrate all the military forces and resist to the utmost any effort to invade Mexico City.

Statement by Diplomats. The president and Mr. Bryan listened attentively to the views of the South American diplomats, especially as they indicated that their governments probably would be unable to recognize any administration in Mexico which refused to give quarter to its enemy or establish itself by peaceful means in accordance with civilized practice among nations. After their talk with the president Secretary Bryan and the three diplomats

went to the State department for a conference. That the influence of the United States was being relied on by Provisional President Carbajal to obtain satisfactory terms from the constitutionalists was explained also by Jose Castellot, personal repremintative of Carbaial. The mediators conferred not only with Mr. Castellot. but also with Emilio Rabassa, head of the delegation which represented Huerta

at the Niagara conferences. Mr. Castellot was confident the American government never would permit an arbitrary entry into Mexico City. He said the Carbajal government wanted no share in the future administration, no validation of the acts of Huerta, but simply 25 guarantees for lives and property.

Commission on It's Way. Word that the commission which will represent Carbajal in negotiations with Carranza had left Mexico City came to Castellot today. The commission departed without obtaining credentials, but since Carranga indicated to the American government that he would receive the commissions full instructions and authorization will be sent them.
