TAYLOR'S SALARY IS \$3,600

Lobeck's Bill Drawn Over to Fix it at This Amount.

SLOAN ACTS FIRST ON MEASURE

Ways and Means Committee Decides Not to Allow Omaha Surveyor \$1,000 as Custodian of Federal Building.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, July 22.—(Special Telegram.)—In the readjustment of salaries for surveyors of customs, based on the amount of business done, the surveyor for Omaha was cut from \$4,500 to \$2,500 in a general readjustment bill which congress passed. Cadet Taylor presented a bill for the port of Omaha protesting vigorously against the rating given him and also as custodian of the government building insisted that his salary should be restored to its old figure, \$3,500, to which he was entitled because the business of his office warranted that amount and \$1,000 as custodian of the government building.

Congressman Lobeck, who saw visions of the congressional primaries coming in and hoping that "one good turn deserves another," introduced a bill re-classifying the collector's salary at the port of Omaha and giving him \$1,000 additional in view of the port Taylor does in looking after the postoffice, custom house, etc.

An strange coincidence, at the meeting of the ways and means committee this morning, Representative Sloan, who made his initial entry into the sacred circle as the baby member of the committee, was called upon to sit in judgment upon Lobeck's bill, to re-classify Cadet Taylor's salary.

Upon the testimony of the treasury expert it was shown that Omaha had been wrongly classified and thereupon a sub-committee was appointed to re-draft Lobeck's bill, but when it came to giving Taylor an honorarium of \$1,000 for looking after the charwomen, laborers, etc., about the government building in Omaha the committee said: "Nothing doing," and so Taylor will have to get along on \$3,500 per year.

Sioux City Market Suffers. Shoppers representing the packers of Chicago and elsewhere yesterday succeeded in getting the agricultural department to raise the quarantine on cattle affected with spenic fever which has existed in several of the southern states. The department agreed to lift the ban on these cattle, but found that Iowa could not take advantage of the situation due to a law of its own creation which will affect the Sioux City market very considerably. Other cattle markets as Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha will be gaining through this order, the demand for cattle being exceedingly active in view of the prices now prevailing.

Praise for Gate City. "Big Cy" Cummings, chairman of the Maryland commission to the Panama-Pacific exposition who was entertained at the Omaha Commercial club by a number of old time residents of the terrapin state, a short time ago, has returned to Washington full of enthusiasm for Omaha and the west. He said today that his trip to the Pacific coast was a liberal education and that Omaha gave promise of being one of the big cities of the country. He could not say enough in praise of the country shown his associates of the Maryland commission and himself while in the Gate City.

called to order the procurator general rose and said: "I am authorized by the government to declare that the documents referred to in yesterday's testimony are only pre-tended copies of documents, which do not exist."

Maitre Labori—We consider the incident closed.

Charles Chenu, the lawyer representing the interests of the Figaro and those of Calmette heirs, then said sarcastically: "I regard the incident as only an enjoyable diversion. It has pleased M. Caillaux to transform criminal trial into a political one. He intends to go from here with a certificate of loyalty to France. Much good will it do him."

The procurator general exclaimed that the honor and patriotism of M. Caillaux remained unstained.

Maitre Labori objected to the language used by Maitre Chenu.

Georges Prestat, a brother-in-law of the murdered editor and chairman of the Figaro company, was then called to the stand and emphatically denied that the Figaro had been in the pay of foreign banks. The Germans, he said, had never held the majority of the shares of the Figaro, as had been alleged. He then read lengthy extracts from memoranda.

Exciting Scene in Court. While Prestat was testifying, Caillaux came from his seat among the witnesses and stood closer to the bar in order to hear better.

Maitre Chenu, commenting on M. Prestat's testimony, said: "I will add that it does not become M. Caillaux to come here and endeavor to soil the grave which his wife made."

Then followed an exciting scene. Many of those in court rose from their seats and shouted "Bravo" while others hissed and murmured until Judge Louis Albaladejo was obliged to call the court to order with a severe reprimand.

M. Caillaux, in a state of extreme agitation, exclaimed: "Since I must take notice of what this lawyer has said, I will ask him if he will take personal responsibility for his words."

Another sensation was caused among the spectators by this exclamation and loud "bravos" for M. Caillaux were heard all over the court.

When the noise had somewhat subsided, Maitre Chenu replied: "I take the entire responsibility. You cannot menace me here. You doubtless do not know the temper of the man whom you address. The disorder in court was

He took an automatic pistol from the package in front of the judges and explained its action. Maitre Chenu then said: "Madame Caillaux did not say when she loaded the pistol."
