Taxable Property in Douglas County

An abstract of the 1914 assessment for Douglas county has been compiled and delivered to the State Board of Equalization at Lincoln by County Assessor Harry G. Counaman. The total assessment of all taxable property as equalized and corrected by the county board is \$46,769,081, a gain of a little more than \$1,000,000 over iast year. The assessed value in Nebrasks is one-fifth of the actual value, which is \$233,945,465. The sum total of personal taxes is \$13,919,792. Among the list of personal items are several which would arouse the curiosity of most permonds and lewelry were but \$19,715. At 11:20 o'clock on the night of the triple murder, John Gard, who lives in the neighborhood of Twenty-fourth and Pacific streets, was told by Mrs. Gard of the shooting. "I have found nothing to cause me to hange my opinion about the affir," declared Chief Dunn. "In reiterating this opinion I do not do so stubbornly; on the ontrary, I would be gind to find myself in error if in doing so I could learn anything about the affair that would lead to the solution of the conundrum. Thus far, however, to my mind, nothing has developed to cause me to honestly believe otherwise than that the three men killed each other.

"The three men were brought up in that neighborhood, and from childhood knew that in time of trouble a quiet tongue is the best remedy. Unusual things are happening in that neighborhood always. At the inquest half a dozen witnesses were careful to announce that they didn't see certain things because they were 'tending strictly to their own business."

"In my opinion, the Schroeders quarreled with Rapp. The latter shot the brothers and they wrested the gun from him and shot him. After being wounded the Schroeders walked several blocks, so I am safe in presuming they had sufficient atrength left to take the gun away from Rapp and shoot him. Maybe after the shooting they all realized the seriousness of the affair. Maybe there was a, brief whispered promise to settle the affair among themselves and keep out of the clutches of the law.
