HE hospitality of "Borgland," the beautiful country home of Gutzon Borglum, the celebrated sculptor of New York, formerly of Omaha, which has heretofore been extended mostly to society and great artists, has been offered to the "Campfire" girls for the summer, and the camp was formally opened this week.

This beautiful country estate, situated near Stamford, Conn., and about an hour's ride from New York City, has probably been the subject of more magazine articles than almost any other country place in the east. The artist owner, besides devoting himself to sculpturing, is also interested in painting, politics, farming and road-building, and in the June number of World's Work are many beautiful illustrations of this 240-acre estate.

Mr. Borglum has many friends among the organizers of the "Campfire" clubs for young girls. Dr. Luther H. Gullck of New York is the founder and president, and Mrs. Charles D. Lanier, who is first vice president, is an intimate friend of Mr. and Mrs. Borglum.

Little Miss Dorothy Darlow, daughter of Mrs. Alfred Darlow of this city, is spending the summer with her uncle, Mr. Gutzon Borglum, and will be initiated into the Campfire Girls' organization this week on her uncle's Harriet Walker of Council Bluffs, Ja.,

There are Campfire groups in every state in the union, besides some in Alaska, Panama, South America, England, Scotland, Belgium, Holland, Spain, China and Japan.

When the Campfire was first organized it was aided financially by John D. Rockefeller, Mrs. Russell Sage, Andrew Carnegie and a number Mesdamesof others, but it is the wish of the organization to become self-supporting. The dues of 50 cents a year, averaging a cent a week from each girl, will not, however, pay for the expenses of vacation camps, so the offer of Mr. Borglum was eagerly accepted.






