Gives Out Bunch of Public Printing of Amendments.

DEMOCRATS IN MAIN BENEFIT

Publication of Measures to Be Voted On in November, as Requested by Law, Goes Into Hands of Faithful.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 24.—(Special.)—A total of 156 Nebraska newspapers this year will publish the three constitutional amendments that come before the voters for consideration this fall.

Wait Has the List.

The list prepared by the governor is now in the hands of Secretary of State Wait and copy for the publishing of the amendments is being sent to the publications designated.

Three amendments are to be published. These concern taxation, jury trials and conviction by five-sixth vote, and the increase of the salaries of state officials.

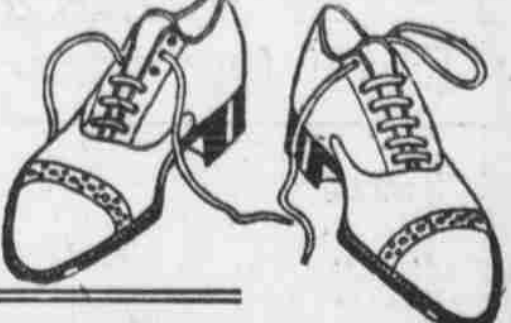
