Charged With Intent to Kill—George Popponophus, who followed his sister from St. Louis to Omaha in an attempt to induce her to leave the man with whom she was living, was bound over to await action of the district court on a charge of shooting with intent to kill. Popponophus tried to kill his sister as she sat in a North Sixteenth street restaurant.

Tourists on Return Trip—On an auto trip of more than 7,000 miles, from Boston to San Francisco and return, with various side trips, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Fowle and their chauffeur, William Hillier, passed through Omaha and stopped at the Henshaw Thursday night. They are now on their return trip, having left their home at Boston early in the summer. They made Omaha on the westward journey June 14.

Soldiers on to San Francisco—A special train of eight cars, carrying 350 soldiers from Columbus barracks, came in over the Illinois Central this afternoon and immediately left for San Francisco over the Burlington. The detachment will go into camp at the Presidio for a month and then be sent to the Philippines, taking the place of soldiers now there and who will be brought back to the states.

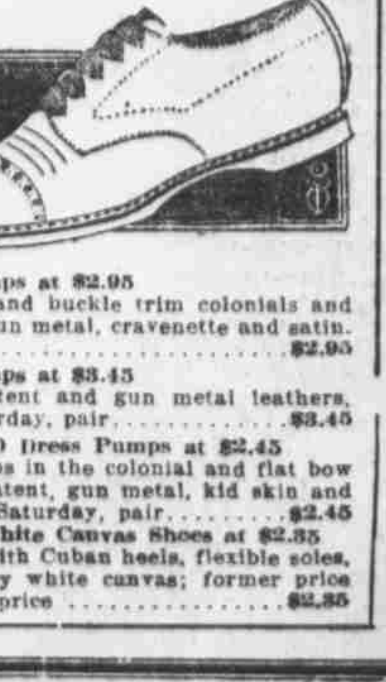
