LINCOLN, Neb., July 24.—(Special Telegram.)—After pitching superb ball for eight innings, Ewman weakened on the ninth and allowed Omaha to tie the score, but Lincoln won in the tenth, 2 to 1. Until the eighth, the Rowkes could gather but two hits off Ewman, a scratch by Conzation and a double by Schlebler, which resulted in an out, when the first baseman attempted to stretch it into a triple. He fanned five and issued no passes. Lincoln scored in the third on Willis' generosity and an error by Graham. Both sides went down one two three until the ninth, when, with one down, Ewman threw Krug's grounder wild to first. He passed Thomas and when Schlebler slashed out a single to left, Krug scored. Conzation and Thomas were both easy outs, however. Omaha threatened again in the tenth when Krug singled to left and Graham to right, but Miller made a great catch of Krug's long fly, which was tagged for a triple and ended the rally.
