Joseph J. Hawthorne Dies After Illness of One Day.

CAMPAIGNED AGAINST PAWNEES

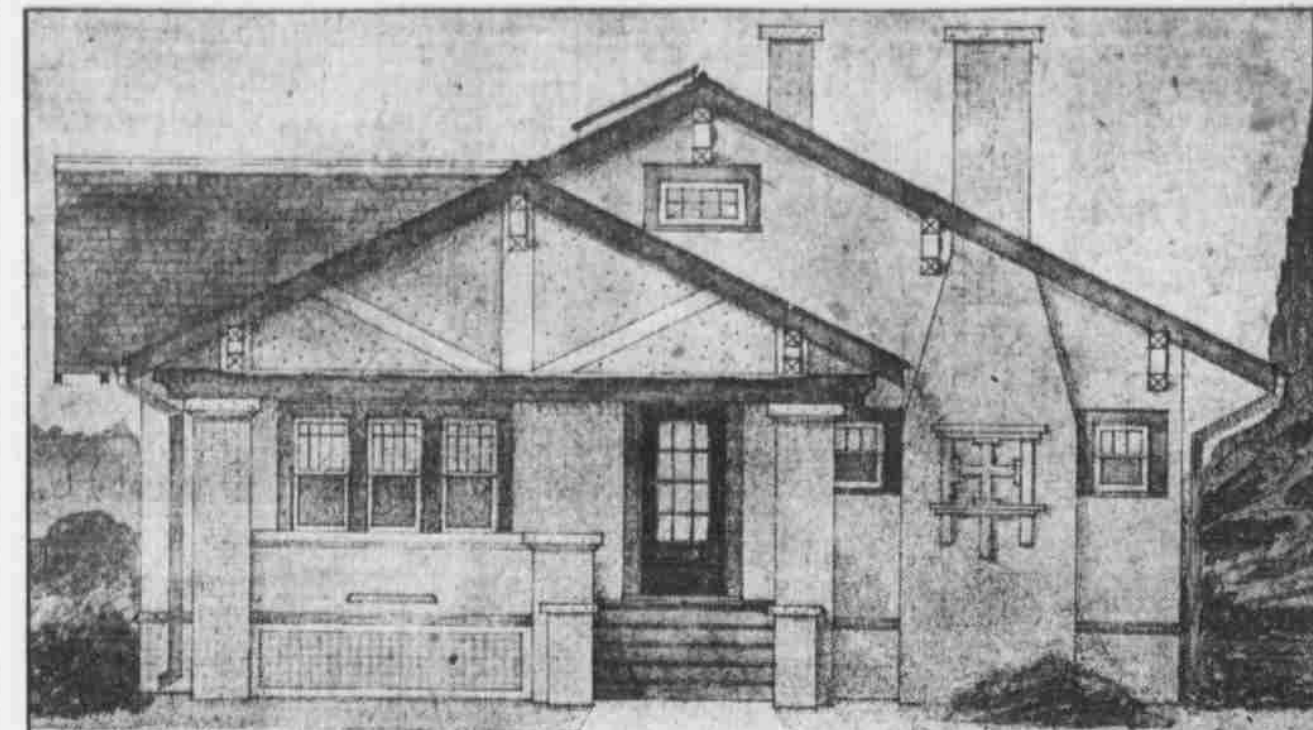

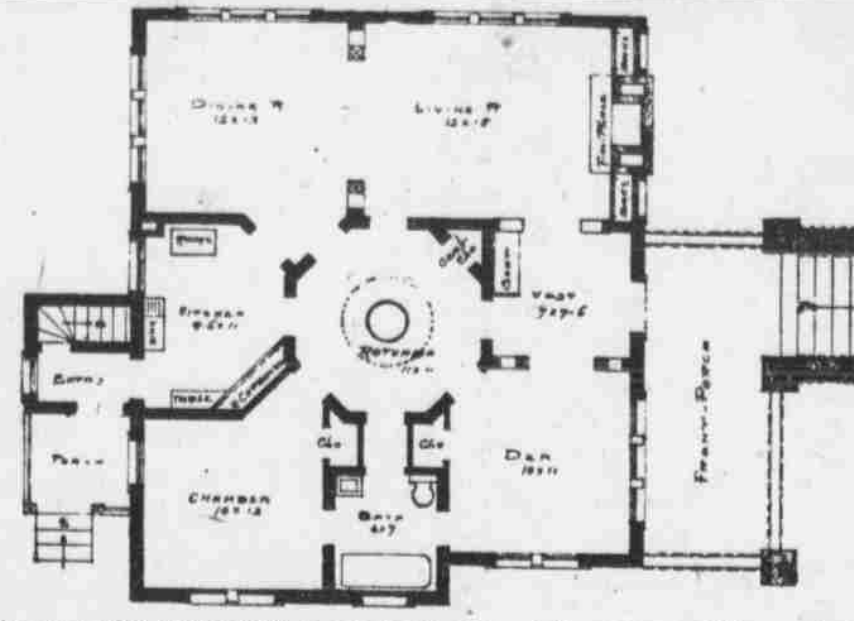

HUNT SECRET CRIME TUNNEL

Chicago Police Search for Mysterious Way Used by Lawbreakers.

GRAND JURY INVESTIGATION ON

Charges of Neglect of Duty to Be Filed Today Against Officers of Twenty-Second Street Station.

CHICAGO, July 25.—Raids in the Chinatown section of the levee district, application for a warrant charging the holder of the amusements license for Fruebers' dance hall, notorious levee center, with violating the 1 o'clock closing ordinance...

Back of all the moves of the police and city officials was a constant desire to learn more of the causes which culminated in the death of Stanley J. Hirsch, city detective, Thursday night of last week...

Rocco Vanille, accused of participating in the shooting and alleged by the state's attorney to be a New York gunner, instructed with a mission to kill W. C. Dannenberg, morals inspector, was not taken before the grand jury...

The physician who examined Vanille told his story to the grand jury.

The Judge of the municipal court delayed the issuance of the warrant against the dance hall at the request of the city prosecutor, who wanted to look up all the authorities before beginning the legal effort to close the place...

Charges of inefficiency and neglect of duty against Michael Ryan, police captain, and James J. McMahon, Michael P. Morrissey and James B. Allman, lieutenants of the Twenty-second street police district until this week, will be filed tomorrow with the Civil Service commission by Chief of Police Gleason.

Stories of alleged neglect of duty and inefficiency were told the commission today by plain clothes men who worked under the officials and who have received the brunt of the criticism aimed at the failure of the police to eliminate commercialized vice from the district.

It was asserted that charges will be filed against nearly every patrolman in the district.

Failure to enforce the 1 o'clock closing law will be the chief object of attacks, Gleason told the commission that he had warned repeatedly the officers of all stations that they would be responsible for all violations of the closing ordinance.

Trace Pessimism About Business to Politics Largely

CHICAGO, July 25.—There is no foundation for much of the agitation about business conditions in the United States, George M. Reynolds, president of the Continental and Commercial National bank, and John Shedd, president of Marshall Field and company, asserted in their testimony today before the federal commission on industrial relations.

The witnesses said much of the pessimism expressed could be traced to politics. "Unrest exists, but there is a great exaggeration of present conditions," Mr. Reynolds said.

"Unrest in industry is worldwide," said Mr. Shedd, "and is caused by a desire for better food, better housing, better clothing and more leisure. A large element is in the prevailing agitation for purely political purposes and by irresponsible purposes of notoriety."

Another element is the rapidly increasing complexity of industrial conditions. "Unrest is a sign of progress, not necessarily an evil."

MOREHEAD AS A RAINMAKER

Governor and Meridian Road Boosters Bring Precipitation.

Party Spends Night at Columbus and Will Continue on Through the State to the North Border Today.

COLUMBUS, Neb., July 25.—(Special Telegram.)—Governor Morehead and his party had all records of past rainmakers far outdistanced. With southern Nebraska suffering for want of rain the first night's stop in Hebron brought on a bountiful shower while tonight at Osceola over an inch of rain struck the town just as the party reached there.

The reception given the Meridian road party has been an ovation all along the line. At Branson on the return trip the party was met by the regimental band of the town and headed by Adjutant General Hall followed by the governor's auto and a long line of citizens marched to the bandstand, where speeches were made by Governor Morehead, Colonel Westergard of New York and Colonel Culp of Texas.

Other towns visited along the route were Strang, Belvidere, Geneva, Fairmont, York, Stromberg, Osceola and Columbus, where the stop was made for the second night in Nebraska.

Nebraska has the distinction of furnishing the only state executive who has kept his promise to meet the Meridian road party and escort it through the state and word has been received that neither of the governors of South or North Dakota will be able to meet the party.

Arrival in Columbus was at 9 p. m., four hours later than schedule time. In spite of the fact that the party was very late in arriving a large crowd greeted them. H. A. Clarke, president of the local association, introduced the speakers. Governor Morehead will leave the party at Pierce tomorrow before they reach the South Dakota line at Yankton.

Culls from the Wire

Announcement was made at Philadelphia that a delegation representing through national associations, more than 1,000 wholesale houses which annually handle products, amounting to \$2,000,000,000 will be received by President Wilson Wednesday to talk over business conditions.

The steamship Huron of Detroit, sailing from Cleveland to the sea through the north channel, with sixty passengers, mostly tourists, ran aground in a dense fog early yesterday on a shifting rock a few miles from the lighthouse at Clapperton island, twenty miles west of Little Current, Ont. Tugs have arrived to aid the Huron.

Upon recommendation of the receivers of the Metropolitan Street Railway company of Kansas City, Mo., Federal Judge Hook ordered an increase of 1 cent an hour in the wages of the employees of the company. The increase will affect about 24,000 men and will cost the company between \$100,000 and \$125,000 a year, according to the estimate of the receivers.
