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U. P. RIVALS DISLIKE ORDER

Say Closing of Denver Gateway in a Hardship. TO TAKE CASE TO HIGH COURT. Other Railroads Assert the Decision Will Turn Eastbound Business as Well as Westbound Union Pacific.

The other Omaha-Denver railroads are not going to submit to the order of the Interstate Commerce Commission closing the Denver and Pullman gateways in favor of the Union Pacific on everything in the freight line except lumber and fruit.

The decision of the commission, representatives of roads other than the Union Pacific take the position that the finding is contrary to public policy, is unfair and is discrimination.

The commission's decision will turn over to the Union Pacific and its subsidiary lines. In addition they go so far as to say that under the decision the Interstate Commerce Commission takes the situation in its own hands and virtually says to the merchants in Missouri river cities that if they have business relations with persons in the western states it must be transacted solely with the Union Pacific.

Not only does the ruling turn over to the Union Pacific all of the westbound business, but railroad representatives contend that if works in the same manner with all shipments coming east, with the exception of lumber and fruit.

Another thing that surprises the railroad men other than those of the Union Pacific is that after the gateway has been opened the Interstate Commerce Commission should suddenly face about and order them closed, and right at a time when business east and westbound is the heaviest of the year.
