GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Foreigners Sell Their Wheat Futures to Surprise of Many.

YELLOW CEREAL UP AND DOWN

Corn Continues in an Unsettled Condition as Conflicting Weather Reports from Various Parts Come In.

OMAHA, July 23, 1914. With a war cloud hovering over the old world and centering on the line between Serbia and Austria, it is not surprising that the wheat market has been unsettled. The buying of wheat by the importing countries would be on a large scale, and the wheat futures they owned at Chicago, and they put out short lines in addition. This reversal of conditions surprised the bulls and bears alike, and it caused an advanced and active market to be changed to a weak and dull one. It was thought before the opening of the board that there would be a runaway affair in the wheat pit.

There is a decline of 3 points in British consola in two days was the increase in the visible supply of 4,675,000 bushels and the heavier receipts at both primary and northwestern markets. The cash takings here by exporters on the decline were smaller at 150,000 bushels. Corn was unsettled because of the changing conditions in many sections. The weather in the southwest was hot and dry, with a little scattered rain in the Ohio valley in the last forty-eight hours, as well as over most of the southern and central parts of the east on Sunday and Sunday night. There were 21 cars inspected at Chicago, compared with seventy-three a year ago. The visible supply decreased 82,000 bushels, and there was a further decrease in Chicago stocks.

Primary receipts for July and September shipments were small at 1,510,000 bushels. Provisions scored a sharp upturn early on the possibility of foreign countries being cut off from the east coast and the fact that the advance early in the morning was well held on the buying of several leading traders, which absorbed the floating supply. The cash trade in meats was still slow.
