Kansas City reported heavy offers of cash wheat from the country, but the prices were not to the tasts of cash handlers.

Wheat market claimed the bulk of the grain trade's attention yesterday and husiness in the corn pit was comparatively quiet. Prices suffered a sharp reaction following a higher opening, and though later making fair recoveries from the bottom, closed 4g/5c lower for the day. CHICAGO, July 20.—Wheat prices rivaled in wildness today the first market results of Austria's declaration of war. A rise of 9c a bushel was scored, partly due to unconfirmed rumors of a final break between Russia and Germany. Trading, however, was deadened both by the virtual refusal of many firms to attempt business and by stoppage of export demand because of uncertainty regarding ocean war risks. The market closed almost benumbed, 6c to 65c higher than last night, but 25c to 3c under the top figures of the seasion. Corn finished at 1c to 3c net advance and oats up 5c to 15c. Provisions lagged throughout and in the end warled from 75c decline to a gain of 15c to 2c as compared with twenty-four hours before.

Developments in the wheat pit came with such surprising swiftness and involved such great yeopardy that numbers of even the largest houses declined at times to accept orders that were accompanied by offers of gilt-edged securities for margins to any limit required.
