Eastern Section of Nebraska is Given a Good Soaking

According to the railroads there was a heavy rain again Thursday night, covering the Missouri valley country from Nebraska City to Sioux City, apparently being lightest in the vicinity of Omaha.

Northwestern reports coming in from the Bonesteel country are to the effect that late Wednesday night and Thursday morning that section was visited by a rain that nearly reached the proportions of a cloudburst.

Around Fairfax and Anoka the precipitation is said to have been six inches, with three inches at Winner and more than two inches at Bonesteel. While none of the Northwestern track was washed out, it was softened by the rain so that trains have been required to proceed with extra caution.

SOCIALISTS AGAINST WAR

Omaha Members of Party Ask Hungarians and Servians to Desist.

IN THE INTEREST OF FEW

Plan is Made to Refrain from Encouraging into Fight and Kill Others Just to Please Some Titled Families.

Local socialists have issued an open letter to Austrians and Servians of America pleading with them to refrain from participating in the European war.

"The 'open letter,' addressed to the Austro-Hungarians and Servians of America follows: 'If the call comes to you as members of the reserve armies of your respective native countries, or if you think your patriotism calls you to go to your country's aid, before you consider the following: 'The men you work for, including the firm that hires you, the merchants you trade with and the minister or priest of your religion, will pat you on the back and call you brave and noble. At the same time these same men will laugh at you behind your back for being so easily wheeled into a quarrel with other workmen when you have no more interest in this war than you have.'"

Quarrel Over Business. Governments—today under capitalism—are composed of "leading citizens."

These "leading citizens" governments quarrel over business, that is, markets and territory.

Being proud, these "leading citizen" governments decide to "protect" their honor—their alleged honor—at any cost.

Reverting to savagery, they decide that "might makes right."

Being brutal they decide "to fight it out."

Being cowardly, they decide to avoid personal danger—to themselves.

Knowing the working class are gullible, these "leading citizens" decide to use you working men as flots.

Being crazy, they decide to distort and corrupt that otherwise worthy trait of all good men to defend their home against all enemies, i.e. to a thing they call patriotism.

Fight Blindly. With "patriotism and the flag" for a slogan you are induced to fight blindly—cheered by silly-battered cowards.

Now, fellow workmen, wouldn't it be more manly, instead of going back to Europe to kill other workmen with whom you have no quarrel and in turn being killed or mangled by others as deluded as yourselves, for each of you to take the following pledge:

"To My Fellow Workmen of All Lands: I refuse to kill your father. I refuse to slay your mother's son. I refuse to plunge a bayonet into the breast of your sister's brother. I refuse to slaughter your sweetheart's lover. I refuse to murder your wife's husband. I refuse to butcher your little child's father. I refuse to set the earth with blood and blind kind eyes with tears. I refuse to assassinate you and then hide my stained fists in the folds of any flag."

Bigelow Thinks it Time to Settle Land Question in Mexico

"It would be a blessing if someone who knew the language and the people and was strong enough to make his influence felt could go into Mexico now while things are ripe there and put those people right on the matter of how to handle their land question," said Herbert S. Bigelow of Cincinnati in Omaha Friday.

Mr. Bigelow says the time is certainly

ripe for putting the land system in Mexico on the right footing there. He believes that to place a high tax on the land values and take the tax off all improvements would be the solution.

"The only system as I see it that would give those people any permanent relief would be the taxation of land values that would take the capital value out of land and make it free to the use of anyone who would pay the annual tax or rent, which in many cases would be no more than the taxes they are paying now."

Mr. Bigelow is on a chautauqua lecture tour. He left Friday afternoon for Iowa City. He says he does not understand

that the land question enters into the present European trouble, but understands it to be rather a race problem.
