

### ENROLLMENT TOTAL HEAVY

Creighton University Shows Gain in Many Departments.

### TO ORGANIZE COLLEGE CLUB

"Greater Creighton" to Be Its Name and Meeting to Shape Its Immediate Future Will Be Held Monday Evening.

The enrollment of Creighton university has now reached a total of 1,945, which is larger than that of a year ago. The total enrollment of the entire school last June, before the summer session began, was 1,600, and this year's total is expected to be far larger.

The dental department, boasting an enrollment of 117, is one of the largest in the country. It shows a gain of approximately 10 per cent over last year.

The student body is more cosmopolitan than ever before, recruiting its students from practically every state in the union, with Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, Kansas, Texas, Wisconsin, Montana and Ohio furnishing the bulk.

The university authorities are now at work on an alumni directory, which will be issued in the near future. It will contain information concerning some 2,000 former Creighton men, of whom 1,300 are now definitely traced.

Of the students at Creighton this year, 600 are new to the institution, the largest number of new students ever entering the university in one year. Some 200 diplomas were presented to students last year.

A "Greater Creighton" club will be formed at a smoker to be held at the arts department of Creighton university Monday evening. Moved by the rapid growth of Creighton university, which now has five departments and an enrollment exceeding 1,900 students, and by the growing student spirit of the institution as a whole, those representative in university affairs plan the organization of a concrete organization of students and friends which shall work for the interests of Creighton.

At Monday's meeting will be present the deans of the five departments, a large delegation from each of the five departmental faculties, the president of each class in each department, many alumni and friends.

This meeting is regarded as one of the most important steps ever taken by Creighton men as a body toward building up their alma mater, and an enthusiastic attendance is assured. The organization has the sanction of the president of Creighton university.

The organization, once formed and officers elected, will take decided steps toward the enlargement of all university activities, and will give a strong backing to any venture undertaken by Creighton university authorities or students as representatives of their school. Those who are closely in touch with affairs at the university feel that Creighton has reached a crisis in its growth and that the growing Creighton spirit should be crystallized in a representative organization.

The starting of the various departments has in the past acted as a damper on concentration of student activity, and it is thought the "Greater Creighton" club will overcome this handicap.

The alumni organization, which is being advocated by representative alumni of Creighton, is expected to assume concrete form in the near future, and a strong organization recruited from all departments will work hand in hand with the "Greater Creighton" club.

The article by Dr. M. J. Scott, medicine '09, which was outlined a plan of organization in the October issue of the Creighton Chronicle, will not appear as planned in that issue, but will be in the November edition.

The first public movement by the "Greater Creighton" club will be a record turnout to the Creighton-Marquette game on Creighton field next Saturday.

At the Calumet restaurant on Douglas street, for some reason the back room was closed down. The word was passed to the visitors by one of the employees that "something had gone wrong," and sorrow expressed that they would have to seek relief elsewhere.

Upstairs over the Chesapeake restaurant on Howard street the drinkables were plainly visible, but apparently no run to get them.

"Lard boss, we've done close after de fust intermission," vociferously exclaimed a negro porter of Charles Lewis "Orpheum bar," at Fifteenth and Harney streets, when he was approached by a pair of thirsty mortals.

"Well, you can fix us up with a little jolt, anyway, can't you?" inquired the dry ones.

"N-no-o-o sir-ree!" pliously denied the other. "We closes prompt soon's de Gayety curtain goes up."

The Legit & Williams bar, 145 Farnam street, was selling beer at 10 cents a glass in the billiard room back of the bar as long as customers remained in the pool hall.

Over at the Horseman on Dodge street the downstairs bar was kept closed, but the laughter and music upstairs seemed to indicate that at least some of the guests had been forehanded enough to order a supply before 5 o'clock.

### NO MONEY IN THE CARNIVAL

Effort to Make Show Clean Reduces the Usual Profits.

### GOVERNORS WELL SATISFIED

Gave the People What They Wanted and Are Not Discouraged Even in Face of the Lessened Receipts.

The Ak-Sar-Ben carnival was a losing proposition. "Dad" Weaver, secretary, outlines the cause in this manner: "The carnival and the shows, on account of the pressure brought to bear from the various sources to give the cleaner and better shows, were all clean and worthy of the patronage given by the better people. In order to get these clean shows here a much larger percentage had to be given them to get them here, which naturally reduced the proceeds on the carnival grounds. This year, with the threatening weather and the rain, together with the small attendance, made the income much less than in previous years."

"Another thing was the fitting up of the new grounds, which increased the expense 25% per cent. But with all that, the governors believe they would have broken even had the weather been more favorable."

"The entertainment, as a whole, including the initiation, floral, electrical and the German day parades, together with the magnificent ball, which was put on a grander scale than ever before, made it more expensive; but it was giving an entertainment that the board of governors were fully satisfied pleased all who attended. The favorable comment which the board has received from every one shows plainly that its efforts were highly appreciated."

"Offers of stronger support being made now by some of the best citizens are stronger and better still. These come voluntarily, urging the governors to form the organization still stronger and to follow out the same principles which they have followed this year, and that next year to make it bigger and better."

The board of governors will meet Monday night to audit the bills and to arrange for the payment of them. Plans for the ensuing year probably will be discussed.

"Ak-Sar-Ben is too old an organization to go backward," Weaver said. "Just because there was a deficiency this year the governors are not 'chicken hearted' enough to say 'we will quit.' We are more determined than ever to roll up our sleeves and jump in and make it better than ever next year."

### Mayor Dahlman Gets Invitation to Come to Meeting in London

A letter has been received by Mayor James C. Dahlman, who is a member of the Anglo-American exposition, which will take place in London next year to celebrate one hundred years of peace and progress between Great Britain and the United States, from Albert E. Kiraly, commissioner general, inviting the mayor on behalf of the executive committee of the exposition to come to London for the purpose of attending an international convention of mayors, which will be held at the exposition under the presidency of the lord mayor of London.

Great interest has been shown in this convention, which will be the first opportunity afforded to the mayors of different important cities to meet in conference and to be able to discuss municipal and civic affairs and methods of government in vogue in the different parts of the world.

**WOMEN ARE ADMITTED TO SOME Y.-M.-C. A. CLASSES**

A new feature of the Young Men's Christian association, and one that promises to be far-reaching in its results, has been inaugurated. For the first time in its history women are admitted to its educational work. The association has secured Oscar Autritt, a teacher of German, to instruct classes for men, women, boys and girls. Several of both sexes attended an open meeting Friday night and learned fifty German words in less than an hour.

One very noticeable feature of the class is that only German is spoken during the entire recitation. Another opportunity to see how the work is conducted will be given next Friday at 5 o'clock. This lesson is free and will be open to both men and women. Classes for women only will be conducted on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week at 10 and 8 o'clock. A mixed class at 10 and men only at 8.

A special class for boys and girls will be held on Saturday mornings at 10 o'clock. All these classes will begin next week. School teachers, business and professional men are indicating an interest in learning to speak German. There are seventy-five lessons in the course.

### HAND EMBROIDERY WOMAN'S GREATEST ACCOMPLISHMENT

**Embroidery Don'ts for the Beginner.** Those who would embroider should have several corks of various sizes in their workbags; they are useful for many purposes.

A pretty idea is to crochet with silk over several corks, attach them to baby ribbon of different lengths; stick the hook, the scissors, the piercer and the needle in them.

Following are a few "Don't's" which the would-be fancy worker in general may find helpful:

First—Don't forget to sit up straight; hold the work up; never bend down to it; and

Don't forget the necessity of a good light, which must fall over the left shoulder.

Don't allow light to shine in the eyes when sewing, reading or embroidering.

Don't work for hours at a time on fine embroidery; it is nerve-trying as well as nerve-tiring.

Don't work roughly or try to hurry. Don't be impatient over embroidery. It never pays; be like our faithful friend, the tortoise—"Slow, but sure."

Don't use sewing needles for embroidery, but buy the proper kind, which come in all sizes for the purpose.

Don't knot the cotton or silk; that causes lumps and makes poor, amateurish work; start and finish with a buttonhole-stitch or two.

Don't work unless your hands are perfectly dry and clean; soiled work of any kind is an abomination, even if it will wash.

### NEW LABORATORY NOW READY AT CREIGHTON

The college classes of Creighton Arts college will begin work in their new physics laboratory Monday under the direction of Rev. William F. Riggs, S. J., dean of the departments of physics and astronomy. The new rooms assigned the college students are on the top floor of the arts college and offer every advantage in the matter of machines for demonstrating the principles of physics.

During the last summer \$600 has been spent in the purchase of new instruments for use by the college classes and many new instruments have been installed in the physics laboratory. Father Riggs states that the students will be able to do much more thorough work with the aid of the new apparatus.

Among the instruments purchased are two micrometer microscopes capable of measuring distances as small as 1-50,000th of an inch. Some of the other apparatus which has been added is a torsion machine, a device to show the principle of a hoisting crane, a level tester, several different types of pendulums and an accelerator machine.
