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### Drake Foot Ball Team Lining Up for Game With Jayhawkers

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DES MOINES, la., Oct. 15.—(Special.)— Head Couch John L. Griffith le sparing no effort to round his Drake university foot ball team into shape for the annual battle with the Kansas Jayhawkers at Lawrence this week, and has been par celing out stiff work-outs to the Bulldogs every day to ge them in the best possible condition to withstand the flerce on-

elaughts of the Kansas offense.
Although Drake defeated the Jayhawkers last fall by the margin of one touchdown, local foot ball fans realize that the Kansans had not yet developed their full strength at that time, while Drake was in mid-season form. Consequently the collegians have a healthy respect for the southerners and are not counting on repeating their last season's victory Drake started the season with the smallest squad of material in the history of the university this fall, but after Coe, a second rate college, had held the locals to a scoreless tie, pressure was brought to bear on a number of players who were not out for the team, and consequently the squad has increased materially.

reconstructed eleven made marked improvement in showing over the efforts of the team that represented Drake at the start of the season, and defeated the strong Grinnell team last Saturday by a 30 to 0 total. The line was strengthened by shifting Fullback Cruil and Halfback Bunz into the forward decase at tackle and guard respectively,

and the center position was greatly bolstered up by the appearance of Hewitt, former all-state high school star at the pivot position, who has not been out for foot ball since entering Drake two years

In the back field Griffith has Captain Simons, regarded as one of best halfbacks in the west; McHenry, another veteran halfback, and Krull, a likely looking recruit from last year's freshman squad. At quarterback, the Drake mentor is playing Marquis, who with a little more experience will develop into one of the best pilots in the conference.

Drake is light again this year, and will have a big handlesp in this respect to overcome in the Kansas game. The entire team averages 161 pounds, or nearly twenty-five pounds to the man less than the Jayhawker eleven that walloped Washington university so decisively last week. Griffith has a number of husky candidates for the line positions, but their lack of experience has kept them on the reserve squad, so far this season. Special attention has been given these men, and if they show an improvement this week, two of them at least will start in the game against Kansas



Are on Increase

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 .- The weekly list of foot ball injuries is appalling as combats of ten years ago, according to an authority on the gridiron game, writing today in the Chicago Daily News. Despits the new rules, many of which were designed to eliminate roughness and lessen chance of injury, the "new" game makes the "old" look like a "parlor pastime," he says. The critic does not blame the modern code or method of play for all the injuries, but says that the changes have, in part, defeated their very purpose because they are respon-sible for losing of the skill with which old time players avoided injury. He cites the instance of one University of Chicago player, weighing only 142 pounds. who went through four seasons under the old rules, carrying the ball more than any other player on his team and yet escaped "time out" only once. Several years later, a successor to this player, weighing more himself, but opposing men of less weight than the "old timers" was taken out in his first college game, suffering more bruises than the first named got in his whole career, according to the critic.
