CHOOSE RYAN FOR UMPIRE

Cornhuskers Accept St. Paul Foot Ball Star for Big Game.

GRADS ON COACHING LINE

"Cy" Mason and Fred Hunter Take Charge of Tackles in Perfecting the Defensive Work of the Team.

LINCOLN, Oct. 15.—(Special.)—Minnesota accepted Ryan, the St. Paul foot ball star, as the third official in the Cornhusker-Gopher game next Saturday, and the matter of officials is now straightened out. Ryan is a competent official, according to Stiehm, and his selection is entirely satisfactory to the Cornhuskers.

Arrangements are complete for all details regarding the game. The construction of bleachers was the biggest job and that has been completed. The management now has arrangements for handling 12,000 people, and the advance ticket sale indicates the capacity of the grounds will be tested.

Nebraska's squad had a long workout last night against the Gophers' plays, as exemplified by the freshmen team. Assistant Coach Dudley saw the South Dakota-Minnesota game two weeks ago and returned with complete notes on the Gopher style of attack. He coached the freshmen with the plays and they worked to a frazzle last night. Nebraska's line was showed around in a most humiliating manner by the first year men and the first year back field was able to make continued gains.

Solve Shift Play. Cy Mason and Fred Hunter, both of whom have had experience against the Gophers, took charge of the tackles and soon had the shift play solved. Toward the close of the game the same plays that had been so good earlier in the evening would avail nothing against the varsity.

The regulars were given the ball but for a few minutes last night, most of the time being devoted to developing the defense. But in the short time the varsity had the ball, they were able to reel off two touchdowns in lightning fashion. Nebraska's backfield played brilliantly and Howard and Purdy were especially effective for long gains.

Stiehm spent considerable time last evening drilling the squad on the kickoff, the varsity both receiving and kicking the ball. The linemen were getting down the field too late on the kickoff, Stiehm believed, and he took this means of correcting it. The varsity's interference was also poor when receiving a kick and Stiehm ironed a few wrinkles out.

With the exception of Shields, the squad is now in better shape than any time since the season opened, and barring injuries, should go against the Gophers in first class condition. Tonight closed

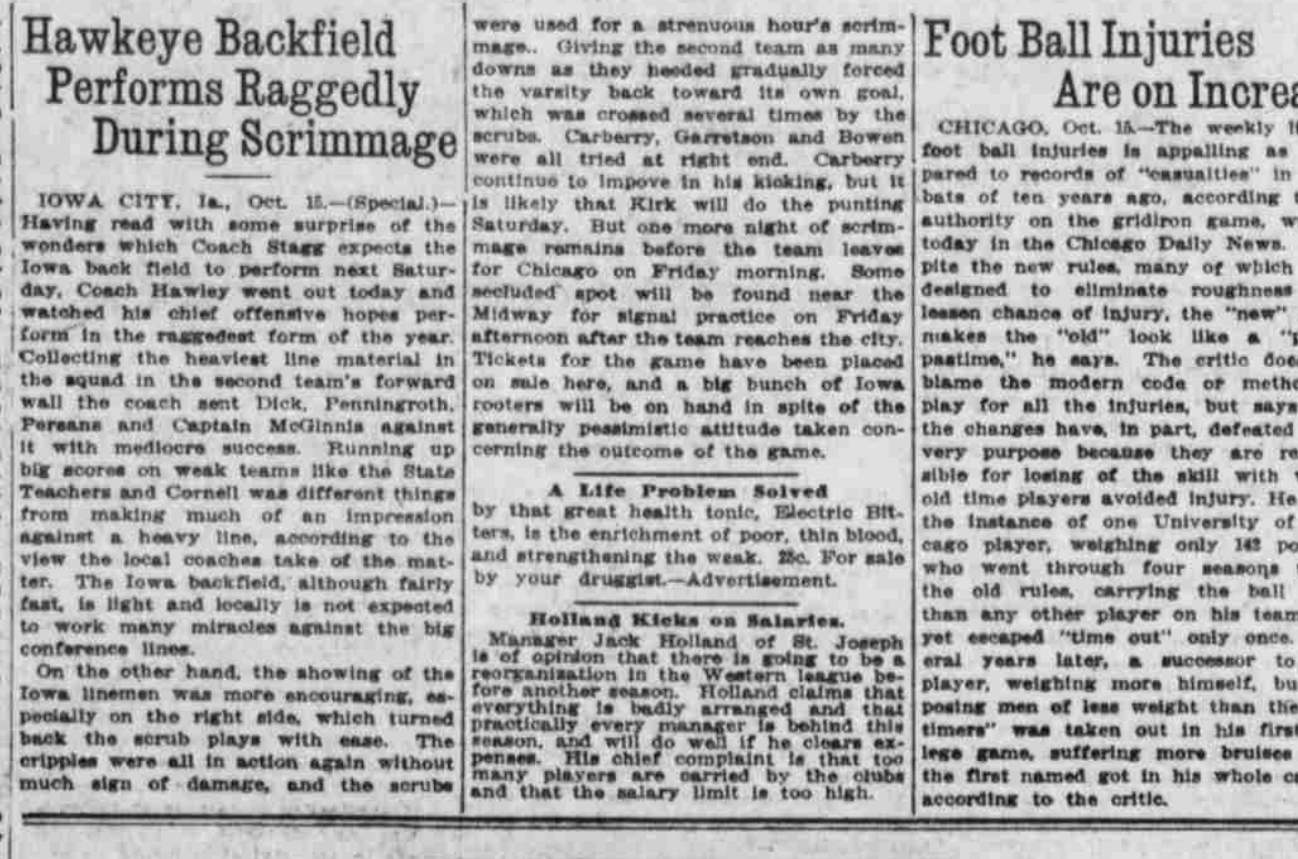
Foot Ball Injuries Are on Increase

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The weekly list of foot ball injuries is appalling as compared to records of "casualties" in combats of ten years ago, according to an authority on the gridiron game, writing today in the Chicago Daily News.

Despite the new rules, many of which were designed to eliminate roughness and lessen chance of injury, the "new" game makes the "old" look like a "barbaric pastime," he says. The critic does not blame the modern code of method of play for all the injuries, but says that the changes have, in part, defeated their very purpose because they are responsible for losing of the skill with which old time players avoided injury. He cites the instance of one University of Chicago player, weighing only 145 pounds, who went through four seasons under the old rules, carrying the ball more than any other player on his team and yet escaped "time out" only once. Several years later, a successor to this player, weighing more himself, but opposing men of less weight than the "old timers" was taken out in his first college game, suffering more bruises than the first named got in his whole career, according to the critic.
