

RYDER TO RAID DRUG STORES

Police Commissioner Says There is Too Much Law Violation. HARD TO GET THE EVIDENCE Says Inspectors Sent Out Report They Are Unable to Get Liquors Because They Are Known to Druggists.

Police Commissioner J. J. Ryder, in a statement issued today, threatens to begin raiding drug stores unless sales of beer and whisky are stopped. The commissioner says he has sent inspectors to these places, but, being strangers, they were unable to buy liquor. He says the public has been complaining of illicit sales of intoxicants by drug stores, but that complainants have so far refused to appear as complaining witnesses in court.

Police Commissioner Ryder's statement follows: It has been coming to the notice of the police department, especially through complaints to my office, that too many druggists in Omaha are selling beer, as well as whisky. Under the law it is now stated they can get away with the whisky sales without any trouble, and in selling beer they are pretty careful as to who gets it. At the beginning of this year we refused licenses to two drug stores whose record was bad. Now, if citizens who complain of the illegal sale of liquor by druggists are willing to give us any definite assistance the police department will exert every effort to secure evidence to convict. We have sent men to suspected places, but strangers cannot get the stuff unless vouchered for by some regular customer. Some drug stores sell almost as much whisky as a saloon, much of it to women, according to the reports of sales filed with the city clerk. Many others sell none at all, or else they fail to make record of sales. The council has the power to revoke any druggist's license for violation of law, but we must have evidence that will stand in court, and no citizen who has complained has been willing to go into court and tell the story. Normally, we hesitate to raid any store on a mere suspicion of law-breaking, but we may just be compelled to resort to that extreme measure, as happened in the case of two drug stores refused license in January last.

Would Sterilize Glasses at Drinking Places in the State

The question of the sterilization of soda glasses at the soda fountains of the state will be taken up Thursday at the meeting of the Nebraska Rexall club at the Hotel Loyal. This will be the second day of the session. The club feels that there should be some more efficient way of providing absolute sanitation in the matter of the glasses used at the soda fountains, and it is likely that before Thursday evening something definite along such lines will be worked out at the meeting. Whether they will ask for state legislation in this regard, or go at the matter in another way remains to be worked out.

The club opened the meeting at 8 o'clock with C. R. Sherman of Omaha presiding. The question of advertising as adapted to small towns was discussed during the forenoon session. S. M. Tarance of Silver Creek, Neb., led with a paper. Discussion followed. Mr. Tarance is the winner of a \$50 prize in an advertising contest of the International Association of Rexall clubs.

Some fifty stockholders of the state are present at the meeting. Among those from other states are Thomas B. Wootan of Boston, director of the department of Rexall clubs of the United Drug company; B. T. Wilkerson of Boston, manager of the stationery and sundries department; Dr. E. B. Baker of Boston, manager of the sold fountain and supplies department; A. S. Mitchell of Springfield, Ill., president of the International Association of Rexall clubs; W. J. Howell of St. Louis, manager of the St. Louis branch of the company; Reid J. Crain, representative of the United Drug company in Nebraska; C. E. Vawter, Iowa representative; M. Montague, Nebraska representative of the candy department; J. J. Hogarty, general representative of the candy department; B. E. Hartford of Boston, general representative of sundries department. The club will conclude the program with a banquet at the Loyal hotel Thursday evening.

Farmers of Douglas County Planning a New Association

Farmers and stock growers living in and near Elkhorn have called a meeting for Saturday, at which time it is planned to form a new Douglas County Agricultural association. Considerable attention has been developed to the present association, whose money for premiums at the recent fair is being held up by court proceedings brought by attorney Ed Smith, and the new organization proposes to form an association, which, they say, will represent both the agricultural and live stock interests of this county.

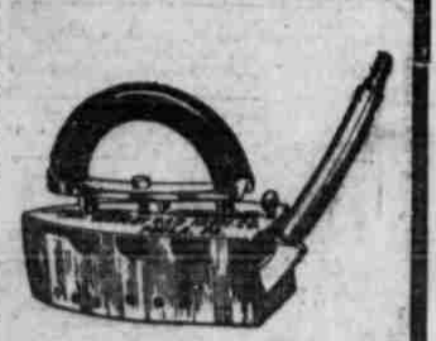
