Uncovers Mastin, Who is Said to Be Best Ever on Team.

LONG GROOMED FOR THE PLACE

Right End Will Be Given Chance to Boost Ball, and Hopes of Cornhusker Athletes Rise to Top Notch.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 16.—(Special.)—Coach Stiehm has uncovered his trump card for the Minnesota game—the Cornhusker mentor, will depend on the boot of Right-end Mastin to bring victory to the Cornhuskers.

Mastin bears the earmarks of the greatest drop kicker Nebraska ever had. Four times last night in the hardest scrimmage the Cornhuskers have had with the freshman squad the trusty boot of Mastin sent the ball spinning between the goal posts from the forty-yard line.

Mastin is as adept at kicking from the side, as when squarely facing the goal posts. When the opposing line apparently has the kick blocked he turns and makes a sideways drive almost as true as if kicking from a natural position.

Best dreamed about the Minnesota battle last night and again he pictured the Nebraska hosts as winners by a 6 to 0 score. Jack is so confident that his dream will come true he is willing to wager a little pile.

Shields Will Play. Shields, giant tackle and former South Omaha star, will again be in the lineup.
