RUSH TO REGISTER KEEPS UP. Railroads Taking In as Much Money as the Land is Worth. ARE RUNNING SPECIAL TRAINS. Union Pacific, Northwestern and Burlington Using Extra Equipment to Handle Those Seeking Government Land.

While the railroad men are firm in the conviction that 10, or a few more, will draw prizes that in value will range from \$2,000 to \$25,000 in the forest reserve and military reservation land lotteries, they are just as thoroughly convinced that the railroad companies are accumulating huge sums of money hauling people to the places of registration.

At this time the Union Pacific is running eight trains daily between Omaha and North Platte, having put on an additional train from Grand Island west, it being exclusively for the benefit of the homeseekers. This train leaves Grand Island at 7:30 each morning, reaching North Platte in time so that registration may be made and parties leave for the east within an hour or two.

Militant Suffragette is Admitted to the United States on Her Own Recognition. CONFERENCE AT WHITE HOUSE. Secretary Wilson Confers with President After Arguments End. ELEMENT OF DOUBT IN THE CASE. Immigration Law is Capable of Flexible Interpretation. CAMINETTI ISSUES THE ORDER. Commissioner Files Memorandum Directing Her Release as Soon as He is Notified of Decision at White House.
