Board of Control Will Hear Wooster's Defense of Convict.

SUNDAY RULES IN QUESTION

Penitentiary Authorities Say Man Is Unruly and Dangerous, While He Says He Merely Refuses to Attend Chapel.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Oct. 20.—(Special.)—The board of control has notified Charles Wooster of Silver Creek that they will hear his argument tomorrow in being kept in his cell because he refuses to obey the rules of the penitentiary. St. Clair contends that he is being kept locked up because he refused to attend chapel exercises on Sundays, and Wooster, who is noted for his stand against the three-day religious services to show the board that they have no right to compel St. Clair to go to church. There are some other things in connection with St. Clair's restriction of prison liberties which have been the cause of his close confinement, as it is claimed he is a dangerous man and not a safe one to be allowed privileges.

Laundry at Millford Burns.

The board of control received a phone message today from Millford that the laundry at the girls industrial school had burned this morning. The fire caught on the roof, which was burned off, but most of the movable stuff in the building was saved.

Y., and came to Lincoln about thirty years ago and was connected with the Lincoln Newspaper Union when it was established.

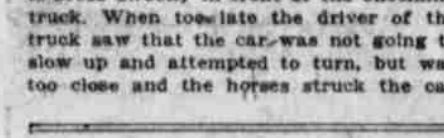
HOOK AND LADDER TRUCK STRIKES CAR IN LINCOLN

LINCOLN, Oct. 20.—(Special.)—A most spectacular accident and one which might have been very serious, resulting in the instant death of one of Lincoln's fine fire horses and the probable dismemberment from service of another, occurred Sunday afternoon at the corner of O and Twelfth streets when hook and ladder truck No. 1, on the way to a fire, crashed head-on into a street car.

The truck was going at full speed and was in full sight of the motorman of the car for a block when the car reached the intersection of the streets and attempted to cross directly in front of the oncoming truck. When the truck saw the car was not going to stop and attempted to turn, but was too close and the horses struck the car.

DOUGLAS CASE IS ARGUED

Lawyers Discuss Rights of Election Commissioner Moorhead.

JUDGES ASK MANY QUESTIONS

Members of Supreme Bench Interrogate Attorneys in Douglas County Registration Contest Over Officials' Duties.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Oct. 20.—(Special.)—The Douglas county election commissioner case was argued in supreme court this morning. Attorneys E. W. Simeral and J. J. Sullivan and Assistant Attorney General Edgerton appearing in behalf of Election Commissioner Harley G. Moorhead and Judge Ben Baker and Attorney L. J. TePoel in opposition to the commissioner. The appeal to the higher court was taken from a ruling of the Douglas county district court, which held that the election commissioner could not arbitrarily deny the right of a man to register who had lost his naturalization papers.

Judge Baker, in his plea before the court, said that if the courts upheld the election commissioner in his contention that he is right to say who should or should not register, it gave that official greater authority than any power on earth and he could if he so desired disfranchise a large percentage of the voters of Douglas county. "It makes him an absolute czar and despot," said the judge.

Hold Statute Explicit.

Judge Baker held that the statutes prescribe the questions which the commissioner should ask an applicant for registry and give him no judicial powers. If he answered all questions in the affirmative the commissioner had no other alternative but to allow him to register.

Frenchman, Living in Shack at Fort Dodge, Draws Prize.

WILL NOT SPEND CENT OF IT Gets Eighteen Thousand Cash and Valuable Coal Land, but Expects to Salt it All Down for Posterity.

FORT DODGE, Ia., Oct. 20.—(Special Telegram.)—O. J. Jadaux, a farmer living east of this city, was notified today he has inherited \$18,000 cash and 200 acres of coal land in Ohio valued at \$1,000 an acre. Jadaux lives on rented land in a shack and his brother made habitable out of an outbuilding. He can neither read nor write English. He is a native of France. Jadaux declares he was not surprised when notified of the windfall as he had known for two years the estate of a woman, relative was being settled and he was to get a big bequest. He contemplates no change in his mode of living.
