

BIG WINTER WHEAT ACREAGE

Railroad Reports Indicate that it is Larger Than Last Year.

SOIL IS IN FINE CONDITION

Rainfall This Autumn Has Been Sufficient and Pastures Are in Fine Condition—Fourth Alfalfa Crop in Good.

The growing season having ended, the Burlington will now cease leasing its weekly crop and soil report until next spring. The report at hand and made from data secured up to last Saturday night indicates that soil conditions throughout Nebraska are most satisfactory, there having been the normal quantity of precipitation over Nebraska last week and well distributed. On the several divisions of the road the rainfall ranged from one-fourth to one and one-half inches, the heaviest being at Salem.

After communicating with the agents from all portions of the state, Superintendent Allen estimates that on the whole the acreage of winter wheat now will exceed last year. Everywhere the plowing and seeding is practically finished and in many localities the grain is up, covering the ground. Some fields where seeding was done early the wheat blades are four to six inches in height, but generally it is just coming through the ground.

In the South Platte county, Superintendent Allen states that there was never a time at this season of the year when the crop looked more promising than now. He estimates that on the Omaha division the acreage will fall 5 per cent below last year, but fully 10 per cent above the average of the last five years. On the Lincoln division he places the acreage at 3 to 10 per cent greater than last year and 15 per cent greater on the Wymore and McCook divisions.

Pastures are reported to be in excellent condition and the fourth cutting of alfalfa in many localities yielding a fair crop.

City to Decide on Auditorium Bonds Election Tuesday

CITY commissioners will pass on the question of a special election to vote bonds for the purchase of the Auditorium at the meeting today. Mayor Dahman has a communication from the Auditorium directors, in which they pledge themselves to pay the expense of an election this fall.

"I'm in favor of letting the people vote on it," said the mayor, "but I do not think it would be desirable to have it mixed up with several other propositions."

Dan R. Butler, commissioner of finance and accounts, says he is opposed to submitting the proposition this fall, because too many elections have been held and "this proposition, which is a good one, probably would be defeated this fall."

Some of the commissioners would not express an opinion as to how they would vote on the proposition, but a majority seem to favor a special election.

Burlington Opens Service on New Line

The Burlington has completed its Powder River line into Casper, Wyo., and on Tuesday regular service will be established. The first train over the line came in from Thermopile yesterday and will go out as No. 1 this morning. There will be no functions attending the beginning of the service.

For the present there will be only one train each way on the Thermopile & Casper line, but as soon as business picks up, the one mixed train will give way to a regular freight and a regular passenger train each way daily. Grading between Casper and Qoin Junction is progressing and unless the weather is too severe, will be continued during the winter.

To give the Burlington's new line the proper send-off, Assistant General Manager Koeller and Assistant General Freight Agent Johnston, of the general offices, have gone to Casper, where they will meet General Agent Hunter of Billings and together make the initial trip, noting what is needed to put the road in perfect condition.

PIONEER MINISTER IS AT PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

Rev. Joel Warner of Hooper, a pioneer preacher, has been attending the synod at the North Presbyterian church. He taught school at Bellevue in 1854, was government teacher in the Omaha reservation for four years under President Grant and for the last thirty-five years has been preaching in several churches in Nebraska. WORKING WITH RAILROADS

Anti-Saloon People Now Using This Method of Procedure.

WORKS BETTER THAN COURTS

Railroads Agree Not to Ship Liquor Into Dry Territory When It Comes From Outside the State.

Instead of going into the courts to handle the situation in Nebraska with regard to the illegal introduction of liquor into dry territory under the Webb-Kenyon bill passed at the last regular session of congress, the Anti-Saloon people of Nebraska are working directly through an understanding with the railroads of the state. A number of requests have been made of the Burlington, the Union Pacific and other railroads, according to Superintendent H. F. Carson of the Anti-Saloon league, that these roads refuse to ship liquor into dry territory within the state, when that liquor has been shipped in from other states. The requests, he says, have in every instance been heeded, and so far it has not been necessary to take any of the cases into court for prosecution.

Some litigation has resulted in Oklahoma, Kansas and a few of the other dry states, but Mr. Carson says the new bill is accomplishing its purpose of preventing the shipping of liquor for illegal purposes into dry territory in interstate commerce. Michigan and Alabama have passed state laws since the advent of the Webb-Kenyon bill that take practically the same steps within the state that the Webb-Kenyon bill takes with regard to interstate shipments of liquor. This makes the law more effective in those

states than it is in a state like Nebraska, or other states that have not kept pace in state legislation with the federal legislation.

Seventeen cases testing the constitutionality of the Webb-Kenyon bill have been brought in United States district courts throughout the country since the adoption of the bill, according to Carson. In thirteen of these the constitutionality of the bill has been upheld, while in four cases it has been declared unconstitutional. Mr. Carson says the anti-saloon people will seek to carry these four cases to the United States supreme court, where they hope once for all to establish without further question the constitutionality of the law.
