ENTRIES CLOSE SATURDAY

Uncle Sam's Lottery Prepares for the Drawing Next Tuesday.

JUDGE WHITTEN ON THE GROUND

Places of Registration to Close at Midnight Saturday—Crowds at These Points Are Diminishing Perceptibly.

At midnight tonight the taking of chances in Uncle Sam's lottery, so far as the lands of the North Platte forest reserve and the military reservation is concerned, will have ended.

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School Principals

Want Miss Ryan for Vice President

Miss Belle M. Ryan, assistant superintendent of public schools, will be the candidate of Omaha school principals for vice president of the Nebraska State Teachers' association.

A committee of principals called on Dr. E. Holovitcher, president of the Omaha Board of Education, and announced their intention to boom the assistant superintendent for the position.

Miss Ryan said she had no information relative to any campaign to make her vice president of the state association. She would make no comment on the action of the committee of principals.

Principal Kate McHugh of the Omaha High school, candidate for president of the Nebraska State Teachers' association, may be left the leading candidate, as it is rumored that Chancellor Samuel Avery of the state university is seriously considering an announcement declining to accept the position.

Superintendent E. U. Graff of the Omaha public schools refused to consider the candidacy for the presidency.

President A. O. Thomas of the Kearney Normal school, who was a candidate, and who has been deposed by the State Board of Education, would be disqualified unless he was reinstated, as an official of the association must be actively engaged in educational work in the state.

Squatter Tries to

Get First Choice of Land at Valentine

A squatter, or sooner, has attempted to steal a march on Uncle Sam in an effort to get hold of the choice tracts of land on the military reserve at Valentine.

However, it is not expected that he will gain any rights of priority, as the Interior department has ruled that the holder of the first number drawn at North Platte next Tuesday will have the choice of the 63 tracts on the two reservations.

At Valentine, the land to be disposed of by the lottery plan joins the town site. Were the main street extended, it would pass through one of the tracts. On this tract, within the last week, a land seeker has built a shack and declares he will hold the land against all comers.

The land is said to be worth \$50 to \$75 an acre.

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WOULD STOP CAR SHORTAGE

Interstate Commerce Commission Issues Statement to Shippers.

CARELESSNESS IS PRIME CAUSE

Shows How Both Railroads and Shippers Can Help Out in the Annual Shortage by a Little Effort.

The Interstate Commerce commission has issued a bit of advice both to shippers and carriers that is intended to eliminate to some extent the annual car shortage, trouble about which the shippers have heard so much in the last few years.

The traffic bureau of the Commerce club in Omaha has received a circular from the commerce commission with respect to car shortages.

Informal complaints to the commission indicate that the annually recurring failure of transportation facilities known as "car shortage" is again appearing.

The commission urges on all shippers and all terminals that close attention to methods of loading, unloading, moving and promptly returning to use the cars now available will go far to insure the present supply of cars sufficient for all purposes.

In order that the business of the country may go forward without interruption, the commission urges shippers, both individually and through their associations, to co-operate to secure the prompt and full loading of cars and their prompt release.

One of the chief causes of failure of car supply in past seasons has been the unnecessary detention of cars by careless shippers and by shippers using them for storage purposes.

The general public interest, shippers should endeavor to release cars at the earliest possible moment, without regard to the free time given them by the tariff.

All the efforts of the shippers will be unavailing, however, unless the carriers also use extraordinary measures to eliminate all delays chargeable to them.

The failure of car supply is usually a failure of car movement. The congestion of terminals is the ever present feature at times of such failure.

The commission is moved to make this appeal by its dearth of cars, which are occasioned by failures of car supply, and by its knowledge that the carriers are here suggested have operated in past seasons to save all concerned from heavy losses.

E. J. McVann, manager of the traffic bureau, says the advice of the commission is sound, and that if all the shippers and carriers lived up to it, the existing equipment would be ample to take care of the tonnage.

Wilson Commutes Jail Sentences of Hyde and Schneider

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—President Wilson today commuted the sentences of Frederick A. Hyde and Joost H. Schneider of California, convicted of celebrated land fraud conspiracies.

The president's action was based on remarkable affidavits of the trial jurors, who swore that their convictions of Hyde and Schneider were a compromise by which they agreed not to convict John A. Benson and Henry P. Diamond, tried with them for the same offense.

The jurors were the two named at the time, and they agreed to convict one and acquit another. Neither Hyde or Schneider had served any time.

Mexican Soon Finds He Can Talk English

ORDINANCE FOR THE NEWSIES

Ryder Will Introduce One Before the Commission Tuesday.

Chicago newspaper circulation managers called on Police Commissioner J. J. Ryder to protest against the enforcement of an ordinance which forbids newsboys to occupy the curbs with their wares.

Commissioner Ryder was appealed to by the Newspaper Dealers' association of Omaha, who said their business was "hurt" by the "curbstone dealers."

Ryder came out flatly in favor of the newsboys. City Attorney John A. Rine has drafted an ordinance repealing the old ordinance and granting newsboys the right to sell magazines and newspapers on the streets.

Mr. Ryder said: "I will introduce this ordinance Tuesday and the newspaper dealers can fight it out before the city commission."

The newspaper dealers, through their attorneys, said boys could, under the law, be prohibited from selling either magazines or papers on the streets, under an
