NEBRASKA women are not sparing the slightest effort to make the Nebraska Suffrage association meeting to be held in Lincoln November 6 and 7 the most successful convention in the history of the organization. The women are waging a campaign this year which is most active and the outcome of it is hoped by the suffragists to gain the Nebraska women the vote.

Each local society will send to this convention a delegation which will work to gain the best for the cause and Omaha will be well represented. The Omaha Political Equality league will have fourteen delegates; the Omaha Suffrage association, the Equal Franchise society, seven, and the South Omaha Equal Franchise league, five, which makes a total of thirty-two delegates from the local societies.

Mrs. Charles W. Russell, president of the Equal Suffrage society; Mrs. Mary B. Newton, president of the Political Equality league; Mrs. E. A. Capen, president of the Omaha Suffrage association, and Mrs. George F. Copper of the South Omaha Equal Franchise league will head four of the largest delegations from this part of the state to the convention, and it is believed that Mrs. Draper Smith of Omaha, the state president, will be elected as her management in the campaign has been most efficient. While the Lincoln society is perhaps the largest suffrage association in the state, it is a non-dues paying organization, and this prevents it from having an active voice in the convention. Petitions have been put in circulation by the enthusiastic suffragists, and Mrs. Frank Harrison at Lincoln, state secretary at headquarters, has requested that every petition be sent to her address, 1313 N. street, Lincoln, not later than Saturday, that the exact number of signatures may be given out at the convention the following Thursday.

Mrs. T. J. Doyle, 1806 D street, Lincoln, is chairman of hospitality, and all delegates will kindly report to Mrs. Doyle that she may provide a hostess for them.

A reception, followed by a suffrage play, will be given the evening of the 6th, and the following evening Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the National Suffrage society, will address the delegates and friends at the Auditorium in Lincoln. The Auditorium has been given the suffragists for the evening by the Commercial club, who are quite in sympathy with the cause of the women.
