KANSAS CITY, Oct. 30.-A plea for eugenic marriages by Governor Simeon E. Baldwin of Connecticut and an address by Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis of Brooklyn, N. Y., on the new social obligations for the church brought to an end tonight the fifteenth triennial councit of the Congregational churches in the United States. The council is regarded as one of the

most important in the church's history. It adopted a new constitution, appointed a general secretary with enlarged advisory powers, brought the eight church societies directly under the guidance of the council and provided for biennial meetings.

Governor Baldwin urged the passage of laws by state legislatures to enable nisters of religion to determine whether parties to the marriage contract are fit before the ministers perform the

Dr. Hillis said: Wealth Obligation to Poverty. "The greatest need of this hour in American society is the need of ministers and parents who will teach this generation that God is more than gold that wealth is an obligation to poverty and that from those who have received

much, much will be required. There is not one industrial problem that would not be solved by the resppearance of the puritan type in our great railways, banks and mines.

"If the republic is to prosper, once again we must produce that splendid type of manhood that can hold our people back from the trampled cornfleids and from bloody streets and fill the land not only with prosperity, but with

SUIT FILED TO HAVE THE SUPREME COURT REVIEW SULZER CASE

New York Printer Alleges that Control of State Has Passed from People to Spoilsmen.

BILL FILED IN DISTRICT COURT It Alleges Impeachment is Illegal

and Void. PRAYS FOR AN INJUNCTION

Asks that Glynn Be Restrained from Acting as Governor. ASKS FOR ACCOUNTING ALSO

Basis of Suit is that Men Have Usurped Office and Converted Vant Funds of State to Their Own Use,

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.-The conviction of William Sulzer by the high court of impeachment and his removal from office as governor of New York was thrown into the federal courts for review today by William H. Moore, a printer of this city. In a remarkable petition Moore alleges that the control of the government of the state of New York has passed from the people to a small group of citigens, and that consequently New York is no longer enjoying a republican form of government as guaranteed by the fed-

eral constitution. Moore seeks to have the court enjoir Martin H. Glynn from exercising any of the functions of governor, prays for the restoration of the office to Sulzer, attacks the assembly for arrogating to itself the power to convene in extraordinary session and pass articles of im-peachment, and concludes his potition with a prayer for an audit of all the

Sulger Knows Nothing of It. Members of the court of impeachment overnor Glynn, Attorney General Carody, Secretary of State May and Suizer himself are named as defendants.
