Supreme Court Holds Railroad Must Build Viaduct.

LOWER COURT IS SUSTAINED

Contention of City Upheld and Passage Over the Company Tracks Must Be Constructed.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—In the supreme court today the city of Omaha scored a victory over the Union Pacific Railroad company.

The decision of the supreme court sustains the findings of the district court of Douglas county. The city council ordered the construction of the viaduct many months ago.

Says Donahoe Told Him Hines Man Back of Attack on Funk

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—A witness for the state in the case of Daniel Donahoe and Isaac Stiefel, charged with conspiracy to defame Clarence S. Funk, today linked the name of Edward Hines, the lumberman, with that of Donahoe.

The witness was Edwin W. Deuter, a bell boy, who testified that he was hired by Stiefel and Donahoe to give false testimony against Funk in the attention suit brought by John C. Henning.

Deuter was testifying as to conversations held in Donahoe's office and elsewhere. "Did you and Donahoe discuss another suit in his office?" witness was asked.

Deuter said that Stiefel had paid him as much as \$75 at a time. Stiefel showed him a picture of Funk, he said, but he told Stiefel he had never seen the man.

Deuter said he was introduced to Stiefel by Dennis Martin, said to be a state's witness who is missing.

Patrick J. Enright, a former bell boy, told of meeting Stiefel, who showed him a photograph of Funk and later employed him at \$3 a day after he lost his hotel position.

Enright said that all he had to do was to go to the hotel and "watch what the Funk people were doing." Enright said that he reported to Stiefel a talk he had with "Edwin Slaviv," a hotel employe.

Slaviv said he knew Mr. Funk and Mrs. Henning and that he had seen them at the hotel," said Enright.

The maximum punishment is life imprisonment.

HODGINS PRIZE DIVIDED BETWEEN TWO DOCTORS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(Special.)—On the recommendation of the committee on the award of the Hodgins prize of \$5,000 for the best treatise "On the Relation of Atmospheric Air to Tuberculosis," which was offered by the Smithsonian institution in connection with the international Congress on Tuberculosis held in Washington in 1908, the institution announced that the prize has been equally divided between Dr. Guy Hinsdale of Hot Springs, Va., for his paper on "Tuberculosis in Relation to Atmospheric Air," and Dr. S. Adolphus Knopf of New York City for his treatise "On the Relation of Atmospheric Air to Tuberculosis."
