New Concern May Go On with Its Business

The case of William Davis, president of the National Rating league, at Chicago, against Walter L. Cropper of the Mutual Rating and Adjusting association of Omaha, which has been hanging fire two weeks in the United States district court, was decided by Judge Mun-ger. The National Rating league was denied the petitioned restraining order, prohibiting the Mutual people from doing business, but the restraining order against Cropper's working for the local

concern was granted.

Cropper had entered into contract with
the National Rating league for a period of five years, during which time he was not to be connected with any other rating and adjustment company. It was alleged that Cropper came to Omaha and organized the Mutual Rating and Adjusting association, but the evidence showed that it was his wife who organized the association, and that her husband merely acted as manager. Cropper, according to the decision, will not be permitted to be an employe of his wife's concern, but the association may continue to do business.
