ROBS MAN IN POLICE COURT

Fainting Bertha Lifts Stickpin Right Before Officers.

HELD ON OTHER CHARGES

Police Are Investigating Reported Robberies from Hotels—Further Hearing Will Be Had Saturday Morning.

Bertha Liebke, "Fainting Bertha," just could not behave in police court, and while she was being examined yesterday before quite a little crowd she fainted and made one skillful effort to relieve Attorney Paul Bowman of a valuable scarf pin. That pin was simply irreplaceable to Bertha and even though she was seeking her freedom again through the eloquence of Judge J. R. Cooley, everything passed before her excepting that tiny bit of jewelry. She wanted and went after it and the court was so moved that it turned the defendant over to the police matron to await further orders.

Later in the day it was decided to give

the woman a continuance of her hearing Saturday morning, the delay coming partially as the result of developments which lead the police to suspect that the woman has been plying her old trade with more or less success in the Home and other local hotels. The suitcase taken from her upon her arrest Thursday morning contained articles which Chief of Detectives Maloney declares belonged to guests of the Home. A charge of larceny will in all probability be filed against her. But whether "grand" or a "petit" depends on the investigation of the detective department. The authorities believe the woman to be demented and declare it is very likely she may be taken to the hospital for the insane.

DODGE STREET REPAVED BEYOND DUNDEE LIMITS

The last brick in the pavement of Dodge street from Fifteenth street to Elmwood park has been laid, and the new road is now in excellent condition for automobiles, buggies and any other kind of vehicle. The extension work from Elmwood park to Fairacres will be started at once by the German Construction company, who also did the paving within the village limits.

Time Limit to Take Out Licenses and to File Bond Extended

Ross L. Hammond, collector of internal revenue, has received a telegram from W. H. Osborn, commissioner of internal revenue at Washington, notifying him that the time for taking out licenses and filing bonds for the collection of foreign items under the new income tax law, which becomes effective Saturday, has been extended by the department to December 1.

This is for the purpose of giving agents collecting on coupons, checks, bills of exchange or other forms in behalf of foreign creditors more time to make application for their licenses to transact such business and to file bonds in conformity therewith. The time between the passage of the act and its interpretation necessitate this extension of the date of the application of this feature of the law.

All persons or corporations doing this kind of business must make application through the collector to the commissioner of internal revenue, and the bond is to be filed with the collector. Failure to procure such licenses and take other preliminary steps is punishable under the law by a fine not exceeding \$5,000, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both. These licenses cost the applicant

nothing and are continued in force until revoked. The rules governing this feature of the new law are the first that have been received at the collector's office. Those relating to the remainder of the law have not yet been sent out from Washington.

ANDERSON STRONG-ARMED; MONEY AND OVERCOAT TAKEN

David Anderson, residing at the Midland hotel, reports to the police that two white men late Thursday evening strong-armed him at Thirtieth and Douglas streets and after going through his pockets securing \$50 in bills, took his overcoat and ran. Anderson furnished a good description of the men, whom he recalled having seen in a saloon carter in the evening.

Chiropractors as Chief Witnesses in Contesting of Will

Chiropractors for the first time in the legal annals of the state are appearing as insanity experts in the trial at Papillon of a suit in which other heirs are attempting to break the will of Bertha E. Mason, leaving her \$6,000 estate to her sister, Florence Moore.

The head of the chief chiropractic school at Oklahoma City, Ok., testified under oath that he could cure typhoid fever and other severe germ diseases; that they as well as minor affections like headaches were caused by "occlusions," or compression in the spinal column of nerves leading to various organs of the body.

He testified that he had taken sixteen insane patients from an asylum and sent them home cured, but asserted that Mrs. Mason, who was at Oklahoma City two years ago a few days after the execution of the will, was incurably insane.

Wendell Wain, who is attempting to break the will, is a chiropractor in Chicago. Mrs. Mason disappeared from her home last June and her body was supposed to have been drowned in the Missouri river.
